FLOWER SHOW PRESENTED BY PETER ADAMS

SUTHERLIN, April 3.—Flower lovers of Sutherlin are being afforded an unusual treat in the display of blossoms from thirty-seven varieties of the gladiolus family grown at the Peter Adams place five miles east of town. Displayed against a black background in the dry glass window of the Piggy Wink store, the beautiful yellow and white blossoms are displayed to their best advantage. From the tiny yellow blossom called the Bulbocodium Conspectus, a wild variety growing in Spain and Portugal, to the huge King Alfred, these early spring flowers run a riot of shades of yellow, shading from delicate cream to deepest gold. Although there are over a thousand varieties in existence, the thirty-seven varieties seen here are those of the flower. Names of these displayed are Robert Sydenham, Sir Watkin, The Pearl, Croesus, Silver Star, Victoria, Twink, Lord Kitchener, Early Sunrise, Hardy Conspectus, Alabaster, Lady Moore, Donna Kanner, Argent, Col. D. Antero, Aspasia, King Alfred, Love Nest, Evangelist, John Evelyn, W. P. Milner, Alice Knight, Firebrand, Emperor, Elvira, Spring Glory, Laurens Koster, Emperor, Ornatus, and of the Jonquil type, the Double Campanella, the Tallus Kostilins, and the Bulbocodium Conspectus (the wild variety).

RULES ADOPTED FOR EAGLE DRILL TEAMS

JAPS, SOVIET SIGN TREATY ON FISHING

MOSCOW, April 3.—(AP)—One of the many sore spots in Japanese-soviet Russia relations has been smoothed, at least temporarily, by the signing of an agreement regarding the annual auction of Siberian fishing lots.

The agreement, which extends to the end of 1939, was signed yesterday after protracted negotiations, frequently marked by sharp diplomatic exchanges.

The previous agreement, expired in December. After it had appeared several times that the two countries were deadlocked hopelessly, the new agreement came in time for Japanese vessels to reach soviet waters, where the Japanese have fished for decades, by April 10, when the season opens.

(Unofficial Japanese sources said Japan had made drastic concessions, particularly in respect to 37 lots which the Russians wished to retain "for strategic reasons.")

Concessions were made by both sides, but the final accord closely resembles the original Russian proposals. Moscow refused to sign a permanent convention throughout the negotiations, and finally won out when the Japanese accepted the temporary agreement.

It was explained in soviet circles, however, the Japanese had agreed to the withdrawal of six lots including two on which they had already built canneries. Japan agreed to a ten per cent increase in rent for fishing lots off eastern Siberia.
