

HOLLYWOOD GOES TO LEAGUE'S TOP

Stars Score All Four Runs in One Frame to Trim Portland Beavers.

The Pacific Coast Baseball league's problem child went to the head of the class today.

Behind the steady pitching of Ed Brandt, the former Pittsburgh twirler, the reorganized Hollywood Stars pushed over four runs in the third inning at Hollywood yesterday for a 4-3 win over Portland that put them undisturbed in the circuit lead.

Hollywood's big inning started when Catcher Crandall was hit by a pitched ball. Harris doubled and Cissell walked. Then Tyack doubled to right field, scoring two. Puccinelli's sacrifice scored Cissell and Herman brought home Tyack with a single. Thomas, on the mound for Portland, allowed seven hits as against 11 made off Brandt.

Portland scored runs in the third, fifth and sixth innings.

The Hollywood club finished next to last in 1938. This year it is under new ownership and has a new ball park under construction. Until 1938 the club was the San Francisco Mission for many years.

Sacramento, meanwhile, took its fifth straight jolt on the chin from Los Angeles at Sacramento last night, 7-1. The Solons haven't won a ball game. Yet this season, which is only five days old.

Oakland, the last-place club last year, moved up into second place behind Hollywood with a 4-3 victory over the San Francisco Seals in an Oakland night game.

At San Diego, Seattle's left field, Hunt, poked out a tenth-inning triple, scoring White, who had walked, to give the Rainiers a 3-2 victory over San Diego. Seattle touched Graghead for nine hits while Barrett was holding the Padres to four.

KRIEGER DEFEATS ALLEN MATTHEWS

SEATTLE, April 5.—(AP)—Solly Krieger, the King Solomon of middleweights everywhere in the world but New York and California, scored two knockdowns and a 10-round decision in a non-title fight with Allen Matthews of St. Louis last night.

Krieger came in fat at 165½, but said after the fight he worked off four pounds and was "really in shape for another 10 rounds." Matthews scaled 164.

Krieger's left hook won the fight for him. It dropped Matthews to one knee for a five count in the seventh and put the Missouri negro down on both knees for eight counts in the ninth round. Solly didn't connect with it much until the sixth when he took the play away from Matthews with left and right uppercuts that had the St. Louisan grumpy-eyed.

The Associated Press scorecard gave Krieger five rounds—the fourth, sixth, seventh, ninth and tenth. Matthews had an edge in the second and fifth, while the first, third and eighth appeared even.

JOE GORDON GETS TOP O. K. OF BOSS

DALLAS, Texas, April 6.—(AP)—Joe Gordon, the Oregon rookie, got the accolade from his boss, Yankee Manager Joe McCarthy, yesterday.

"Gordon is a finished second baseman this year," the New York American league club skipper said. "Last year I knew he had the makings but he lacked the confidence he has now."

McCarthy said the Yankees' greatest improvement over last year rested in Gordon and Joe DiMaggio.

DiMaggio, going through his first full training program, has belted the ball for a .394 average in 22 games.

McCarthy said he rated this year's team above last year's but made the eternal qualification of baseball managers—"providing we get the same sort of pitching."

BENEFIT GAME FOR STRATTON DATED

CHICAGO, April 6.—(AP)—Monty Stratton, crippled Chicago White Sox pitcher, stands to gain \$20,000 or \$25,000 from the benefit game between his former mates and the Chicago Cubs at Comiskey park April 17. Harry Grabner, White Sox vice president, disclosed today. Grabner said "box seats are all almost gone and the grandstand seats, upstairs and down, are going fast."

Stratton's right leg was amputated last November after a hunting accident.

SOUTHERN OREGON FACES DRY SPELL

MEDFORD, Ore., April 5.—(AP)—Water conditions in the southern Oregon region this season are likely to be comparable to the 1934 dry season, except that irrigation storage supplies will be ample, and late summer flow of major streams will be nearly normal, though much below last year. Small streams will be low early, having heavy late spring precipitation.

These conclusions were reached here Wednesday at the first of a series of regional water forecast meetings. Predictions are based on snow course measurements and observations and cover Douglas, Josephine, Klamath and Jackson counties, and include the Rogue, Umpqua and Klamath basins.

No flood conditions are anticipated in the area this spring as the run-off is far advanced.

HENDERSON MAY SUCCEED DOUGLAS

WASHINGTON, April 5.—(AP)—Senate confirmation yesterday of William O. Douglas as supreme court justice brought renewed predictions from some senators today that Henderson, now deal secretary, would get his place as chairman of the securities commission.

Henderson is executive secretary of the federal monopoly committee. He formerly was a consulting economist to the WPA.

The SEC elects its own chairman, and Mr. Roosevelt thus can only appoint a new member. The president's wishes as to the agency's head, however, presumably would be considered by the members.

CHINESE, JAPANESE WARPLANES DUEL

SHANGHAI, April 5.—(AP)—Chinese and Japanese warplanes bombed and machine-gunned today behind fast-moving battlelines.

Japanese airmen paid another call on Shan, capital of the so-called "red" province of Shenai and reported severe damage to military establishments.

Chinese airmen said 120 houses were destroyed but most of the civilian population had been evacuated and there were only seven persons killed and 30 injured.

Japanese also bombed Suhsien and Tainhsien in central Hopeh province and Linchow in Kwangtung.

Chinese planes were reported to have raided Nanchang, Kiangsi province capital recently lost to the Japanese, machine-gunning Japanese troops and bombing a munitions depot.

Japanese planes yesterday attacked Changsha, Hunan province capital which is now the principal target of the greatest Japanese land offensive. Twenty Chinese were reported killed and 120 injured.

CONTEMPT RULING HITS CIO OFFICIALS

DES MOINES, Ia., April 4.—(AP)—The Iowa supreme court today ruled three CIO union officials guilty of contempt of court in the Maytag company strike at Newton, Ia., last summer must pay fines of \$500 each.

Six-month jail sentences against the men were revoked in an opinion written by Justice Frederic M. Miller.

The defendants, James B. Carey of New York, William Senter of St. Louis, and Hollis Hall of Newton, were convicted of violating a district court injunction issued by Judge Frank Bechtel during the three-month strike at the washing machine factory.

EMPLOYERS ASSN. PLANS NEW UNITS

EUGENE, April 5.—(AP)—Coincident with labor's attack at Portland on the validity of the labor-control law, the Associated Employers of Oregon executive board proposed yesterday to organize support for the act.

The association planned to establish units at Portland, Astoria, St. Helens, Medford, Klamath Falls, Burns and Cottage Grove.

SEAL MIGRATION COUNT 2,500,000

ASTORIA, April 5.—(AP)—There are approximately 2,500,000 fur seal swimming toward the tip of the world to summer on Pribilof islands in the Bering sea.

Members of the crew of the coast guard cutter Onondaga made that estimate upon returning to their base after convoying the gigantic migration along the Oregon and part of the Washington coast.
