SEATTLE HALVES FUNDS FOR RELIEF

Single Person Will Get 20 Cents Per Day, Those in Families Less.

SEATTLE, April 6.—(AP)—City and county officials ordered food allowances of 20 cents a day for jobless single men today to meet a "relief crisis" resulting from curtailment of state aid and WPA employment in King county (Seattle).

"Vouchers will be given out immediately, though we don't know yet where the money is coming from," said County Commissioner Tom Smith.

Smith said the 20-cent grant is half that provided previously. He said persons in family groups would be allowed \$2.50 monthly per person, compared with \$5.00 before relief cuts.

The commissioner declared there are 20,000 persons in King county without food or shelter as result of the curtailments.

Officials said the temporary grants would continue until April 30, and a single men's dormitory, previously ordered closed, would remain open until that date. Several hundred men have conducted a "sleep-in" strike there since Saturday, defying closing orders.

Councilwoman F. F. Powell said the city council would consider today possible action to move a courthouse lawn tent colony which jobless men designated "camp No. 2."

Mayor Arthur B. Langlie asked the men to move.
