PHILOMATH MILL RAZED BY FLAMES

PHILOMATH, Ore., April 6.—(AP)—Workmen ran to safety, leaving their lunches and coats to the flames, Tuesday when a fire, apparently started by a gas pocket exploding in a sawdust pile, destroyed the Floyd Zeller sawmill. The plant, having a daily capacity of 15,000 board feet of lumber, employed 18 men. Estimates of the loss were not available but officials said there was no insurance on either buildings or machinery.

JAP PLANES RAID CHINESE AIRDROME

SHANGHAI, April 7.—(AP)—Co-operating for the first time in a formation flight, Japanese army and navy bombers today raided a Chinese airdrome at Chikiang, western Hunan, and reported destruction of six Chinese bombing planes.

Severe fighting continues along the Han river, northwest of Hankow, where the Japanese have been blocked from a westward crossing toward Shensi and Ichang, Hupeh province ports on the Yangtze, despite a one-month offensive. In South China, the Japanese were trying to mop up areas between Canton and the Portuguese colony of Macao, south of Canton along the east coast, south of Shanghai, there was sporadic but indecisive fighting in the Hangchow area.

SEWER STATUS OF CITY "FORTUNATE"

Advanced Stage of Local Project Gets Praise of Visiting Engineer.

The city of Roseburg is in an extremely fortunate position with regard to its sewage disposal plant, according to L. R. Stockman, consulting engineer, who is here today from his home in Baker, Oregon, to meet with the city council and WPA officials. Mr. Stockman, one of the pioneer engineers in sewage disposal, is now engaged in disposal plant installations in four northwestern states.

He was employed by the city of Roseburg six years ago when the city first started its project, and is preparing the final plans for the plant soon to be built here.

"Congress has adopted laws against stream pollution and soon will demand that states enforce these laws," Mr. Stockman said. "It is going to be very difficult for many cities to finance the cost of the plants necessary to provide for sewage disposal. Roseburg is indeed fortunate that it has its project so far advanced and at such an exceptionally low cost to the taxpayers."

Roseburg's intercepting sewer system and disposal plant are being financed in cooperation with the works progress administration with the latter agency furnishing all labor, together with a grant toward materials.

Roseburg Plans Approved
Mr. Stockman reports that he has been spending the past few days with officers of the state board of health and has been given verbal approval of the plans for the plant to be built at Roseburg. This plant, he states, will be changed very materially from the plans first proposed in 1933 and will provide for complete treatment. The type of equipment and installation now planned, he said, is of a design being uniformly used and having general approval of health boards. At a similar installation at Baker, he reports, the water leaving the final stage of purification was so pure that trout from mountain

streams were kept in the water for more than six months, while water at the intake was so heavily polluted that it killed goldfish which can live in water bearing a high degree of pollution.

A conference is to be held this evening by members of the city council and the engineers and foremen engaged in the WPA project at which the engineering details of the proposed plant will be explained by Mr. Stockman.
