RECENTLY PUBLISHED BOOKS NOW AVAILABLE AT ROSEBURG PUBLIC LIBRARY

Recent books published and now available readers at the Roseburg Public Library include:

Konigsmark by A. E. W. Mason is a vivid historical romance which brings to light one of the 17th century's most poignant romances. Philip Konigsmark, whom history would judge a failure, emerges a tremendous figure, and Sophia Doroties, whose descendants were to sit upon the English and Prussian thrones is a very real and appealing character. This is a historical romance of a high order.

This Nettle, Danger by Philip Gibbs. Sir Philip Gibbs, a former war correspondent, who is profoundly interested in the cause of peace, writes a contemporary novel based upon important world problems. It is the story of an American newspaper man in London in the desperate days before Munich. John Barton, correspondent of a New York paper, is in love with Lady Anne Edie, conservative daughter of a peer, whose views appear to Barton to be excessively reactionary. When they at last find a common ground on which their views are reconciled—the necessity of peace—both their lives are profoundly touched by the events of the past year in Europe.

The Yuletide by Roger Martin du Gard. This great novel of the World War is by a French winner of the Nobel prize for literature and is a literary Guild selection.

Wine of Good Hope by David Rame. For three generations the men of the Lemay family have dwelt in the beautiful South African estate to go adventuring. Deeply devoted to the farm, the boy Tony cannot conceive of a time when he would want to leave it. But those who are fond of him betray some sign of the wandering Lemay blood. Particularly is this true of Lowell Marlow, an enchanting girl of thirteen, who is precociously in love with Tony, as he is with her. Apart from the adventure of the story is the freshness and charm of the writing. It is a brilliant first novel.

Grapes of Wrath by John Steinbeck. His novel is the story of the Joad family, forced from their land near the Arkansas-Oklahoma border, lured pathetically by handbills inviting them along with thousands of others to create an oversupply of cheap seasonal labor in California, and of what they encountered when they reached the Promised Land.

Blue Water Vagabond by Dennis Puleston is his adventures in a seabattered yacht, the sturdy Udra, by a young Englishman, who lived a landlubber's dream. For six years he cruised the South and China seas. In England, he found himself in charge of a derelict coconuts estate until a hurricane devastated it, and he shipped on a wandering schooner for America. A salvage expedition off the coast of Santo Domingo was followed by cruising the islands of the Pacific. Malaria in New Guinea, war adventures in China and Siberia brought to a close one of the most adventures filled Odysseys of modern times.
