U. S. TRYING TO END COAL STRIKE

NEW YORK, April 7.—(AP)—

The government, acting through a labor department conciliator, moved today to break the four-week deadlock between bituminous miners and operators who have been seeking a new wage-hour agreement.

The conciliator, James F. Dewey, was called before the committee of four Appalachian operators and four representatives of the United Mine Workers of America (U. M. W.) after he requested an opportunity to address the negotiators.

The contract under which the miners had been working expired March 31. Meanwhile 335,000 miners are idle.

Philip Murray, vice president of the United Mine Workers, told the joint conference of operators and miners on Tuesday that the miners were willing to accept a renewal of the old contract for two years provided the penalty clause for illegal strikes was eliminated.

The penalty clause, included in the separate district agreements, appeared to be the major point of contention. The operators had said "no" to 26 proposals the union made for increased wages, shorter hours and improved working conditions.

PITTSBURGH, April 7.—(AP)—Thousands of persons in the nation's vast bituminous coal fields today faced a payless Easter as the mine shutdown spread to the railroads and truckers.

Three of West Virginia's largest coal carrying railroads sent out furious notices and in Pennsylvania truckers were notified to get permits from U. M. W. District Organizer Fred Thomas, of Johnstown, Pa., before they could move.

INDICTMENT HITS DEATH CAR DRIVER

McMINNVILLE, April 7.—(AP)—Arthur Osborne, 30, driver of an automobile which skidded and crashed into a telephone pole near Amity last Sunday, killing one youth and injuring three others, was indicted by the county grand
