BOYCOTT THREAT

LEVELED AT SALEM

SILVERTON, April 10.—(AP)—An abeyant city council and chamber of commerce road committee threatened to boycott Salem today after condemning the Marion county court for deciding to use a \$37,000 federal road grant on the Salem and not the Silverton end of the Salem-Silverton highway.

The groups asserted the five miles near Silverton were in poorer condition than the stretch near the capital. They added the highway was the second heaviest traveled road in the county.

The road committee charged the failure of two farmers to grant donated rights of way had been used by the court as an excuse to begin repairs on the Salem side.

"Rather than travel the dangerous stretch to Salem, we'll do our out-of-town shopping and show-going at Portland," the committee said.

"Other valley towns will join us in putting attention on further improvement of the Cascade highway into Portland and even as it is

now, Portland is but 50 minutes from us."

Farm Brevities

The 10 most important trees in the world, as listed by an American forestry expert, respectively are: the date palm, coconut palm, almond, apple, fig, mulberry, olive, lemon, chinquana, and rubber trees. Potatoes too "sleepy" to sprout are: the date palm, coconut palm, rhodod, and they begin to show signs of "awakening" almost immediately, farm experts say.

Hens inherit the trait of cackling after laying an egg from their wild ancestors. Jungle fowl, after taking time out to lay an egg, cackled to signal their whereabouts to the wandering flock.

In France, some geese are fed by forcing food through a funnel into the bird's mouth. Such forcible feeding enlarges the fowl's liver for use as pate de foie gras.

Poultry producers will buy about eight per cent more hatchery chicks in 1939 than in 1938, says an estimate by the federal bureau of agricultural economics.

More than a fourth of the farms in the United States produce an average of less than \$600 worth of products annually, and 15 per cent of this number produce less than \$400 worth of commodities. Government experts estimated nearly 65 per cent of the total crop land in the United States, 282,659,000 acres, was affected by some phase of the agricultural adjustment program in 1938.

SOLD LIVESTOCK

MUST BE CERTIFIED

SALEM, April 10.—(AP)—Operators of stables which sell livestock will be required to issue signed certificates at the time of sale under a new law which the department of agriculture has begun to enforce.

The law is designated to prevent fraud. To prevent spread of disease, stables are required to obtain health certificates for cattle before selling or leasing them.

Inscribed on the walls of the Egyptian king's crypt were these words:

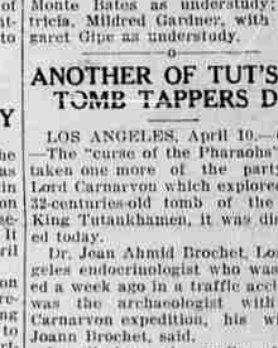
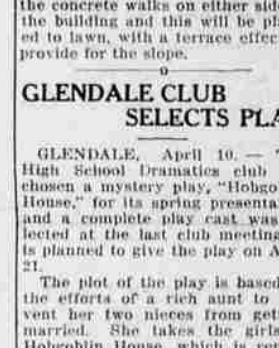
"Death shall come on swift wings to him that toucheth the tomb of the Pharaoh."

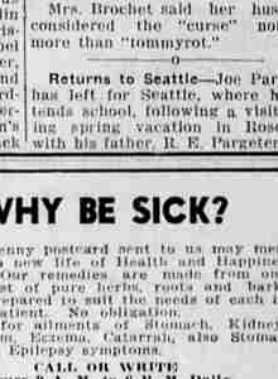

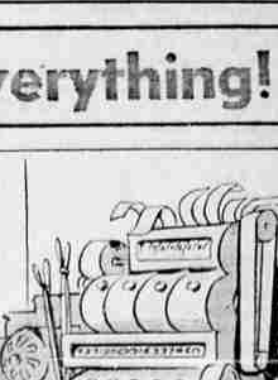

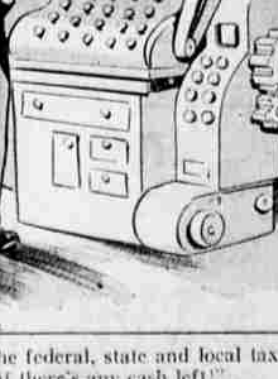
