

TYPES OF EUROPE'S DEMOCRACY RAPPED

Bishop Scores "Wolves in Sheep's Clothing" in Cautioning U. S.

SEATTLE, April 10. (AP)—Warning that the United States should keep out of war, the Most Rev. Gerald Sheehan, bishop of the Seattle Catholic diocese, expressed the hope in an Easter sermon yesterday that this nation will be on guard against the brand of "European democracy that we are called upon to save. Many of the so-called democratic nations, he said, are 'wolves in sheep's clothing.'"

He warned that "we are today on the brink of war because many of our leaders, unable to use fundamental principles of justice and morality, are again, as did our leaders a quarter-century ago, mouthing euphemistic phrases and uttering rapid epithets that catch and inflame the unthinking."

Weighing the brand of democracy that the United States may be called upon to save, he said:

"Does it appear today that such the election call will come to us to stand shoulder to shoulder with the Russian bear? What is the democracy that she exemplifies? It is the democracy, if you call it that, that suppresses all religion."

"Again, if we are asked to fight side by side with democratic France against the dictators of the world let us remember that France, in preparation for the conflict, has distinctly named its ruler as dictator and created him those powers that it desires in other rulers."

"And, finally, if we are asked to save again the great British democracy let us first analyze how that democracy works. Let us ask the hill tribes of India what brand of democracy is meted out to them. Let us ask the gold and diamond workers of South Africa to tell us the story of the blessings of democracy they enjoy. Let us ask the Irish of six counties to come forward and proclaim the inestimable blessings of democracy bestowed upon them by the crushing British government."

BOTH SIDES CLAIM VICTORIES IN CHINA

SHANGHAI, April 10. (AP)—Strategic victories were claimed by both Chinese and Japanese today after heavy fighting in Kiangsu province, southern China.

The Chinese reported they had stopped a Japanese advance near Wuning, 70 miles northwest of Nanchang, the provincial capital, and by counter-attacks along the Nanchang-Changsha highway, had recaptured Kaum, which the invaders occupied a week ago at great cost.

The Japanese attempted to follow up the recent capture of Nanchang with a thrust toward Changsha, Hunan provincial capital, in order to open the way to possible invasion of the southwest, where Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek is centering Chinese efforts to carry on the war.

The invaders said one step of this plan was achieved when their forces southwest of Nanchang surrounded several Chinese detachments. "Seven hundred Chinese were reported slain."

Throughout western Kiangsu province, the Japanese said, the invaders won numerous isolated victories.

In northern Hunan, Chinese communications said, the Japanese were hard pressed to hold Yachow, Yangtze river city.

P. G. E. HEAD HITS AT DAM BOOKLET

PORTLAND, April 10. (AP)—Private utilities do not "pad charges" or operate "dishonestly," Franklin T. Griffith, president of the Portland General Electric company, declared Saturday in demanding the Bonneville dam administration revise statements in a recent booklet.

Speaking to the East Side Commercial club, Griffith asserted the dam's publicity men placed such intimations in the booklet. He quoted the offending paragraph:

"These partially idle distribution systems represent the major expense to power users. Merely pass the cost along to the consumer, generating costs will mean little to the average consumer, perhaps 20 cents a month. But such distribution expenses, eliminate padded charges and operate honestly and efficiently, and power bills can be cut in two."

Griffith said in reply:

"The only way to reduce engineering costs is to increase the use of appliances used in distribution. There are no padded costs, no excessive costs in the distribution by private companies. It will cost just as much to employ the same men to do the same kind of work whether it is done by the private company or the public agency. Engineers will tell you as you increase your load factor you reduce your cost."
