COLLECTION OF BACK TAXES DEMANDED

PORTLAND, April 12.—(AP)—Some 1000 federal employees in Oregon will have to dig up three years of back state income taxes if John W. Kaste, Portland attorney, has his way.

He demanded yesterday the state tax commission assess them retroactively for three years now that the federal supreme court has ruled salaries of federal, state, and municipal employees are not exempt.

Congress set 1939 as the first year in which the federal government would collect from state employees and the tax commission declined to follow suit. Kaste claimed, however, the commission acted outside its authority.

He said if the commission rejected the plan he would ask Attorney General T. H. Van Winkle to bring mandamus action.

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LITTLE THEATRE ATTRACTS CROWDS

More than 150,000 visitors to San Francisco's Golden Gate International exposition on Treasure Island have attended the National Discuit company "Little Theatre" performances since opening day, S. W. Rodda, regional sales manager, reported last week.
