Yet Pattern 8441's style is sufficiently simple and young to please fastidious mothers, too. The frills, the wide shoulders, the exaggerated flare of the skirt, are all very becoming to girls between sizes 10 and 16 who are inclined to be a bit thin and lanky.

This dress will be pretty in any fabric, so long as it's taffeta. But other possibilities are flat crepe, organdy and dotted Swiss.

Pattern No. 8441 is designed for sizes 10, 12, 14 and 16 years. Size 12 requires 3 yards of 39-inch material; 1 1/2 yards of ruffling or pleating. Five yards of ribbon or braid to trim skirt. To trim neck and sleeves with one row of ribbon (as pictured in small view) requires 1 1/2 yards.
