CLOSER AMERICAN TRADE BOND SOUGHT

WASHINGTON, April 12.—(AP)—President Roosevelt recommended today congress authorize a far reaching program of cooperative activity designed to bring the United States and the other American republics closer together. He sent to the legislators a report from Secretary Hull on the program proposed last November by an interdepartmental committee. The interdepartmental committee estimated the total cost of the cooperative activities in the fiscal year beginning next July 1 would be \$998,804. Among them are surveys to determine products which Latin American countries could produce and sell to this country without competing with United States products.
