NOBLE TO BECOME AIDE OF HOPKINS

WASHINGTON, April 12.—(AP)—The white house announced today that Edward J. Noble, Connecticut republican, was resigning from the chairmanship of the civil aeronautics authority to become a special assistant to Secretary of Commerce Hopkins.

Stephen Early, presidential secretary, told reporters that President Roosevelt had approved a plan of Hopkins to ask congress to create the office of undersecretary in the commerce department.

When and if that office is created, Early said, it is expected that Noble will be appointed to it. Noble's resignation from the civil aeronautics authority will take effect on the date of his appointment to the new office.

W. P. Warner Stated In all probability, Early asserted, the president will recommend the appointment of Edward P. Warner of Connecticut, to the authority to fill the vacancy caused by Noble's resignation and Hinckley's promotion.

Warner, a republican, is a former assistant secretary of the navy for aeronautics. He now is special economic and technical adviser to the authority.

Noble will take immediate charge of the commerce department's vast business bureau—the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce.

STATE JOB ENDS HERO'S COMPLAINT

BOISE, Idaho, April 12.—(AP)—Tom Neilbar, Idaho's best known World War hero who found a congressional medal on honor incommensurate with his WPA job, landed employment with the state today.

He was appointed a policeman in the Idaho statehouse on orders of Governor C. A. Bottolfsen. His job, paying \$125 a month, starts tomorrow.

"If I can hang on to this job I may decide to keep that medal after all," said Neilbar, father of seven children and who single-handedly stopped a German assault and headed a group of enemy soldiers to American lines.

Neilbar mailed his medal to Senator Borah (R-Idaho) recently and asked him to turn it in to the war department because, he said, his earnings on WPA were "not sufficient to support a medal of honor."

WASHINGTON, April 12.—(AP)—President Roosevelt has signed the bill wiping out immunity of federal and state employees from income taxation.

The measure, which a secretary said the president signed last night, permits the federal government to tax the salaries of state officials and employees, and state governments to tax the salaries of federal officials and employees.

The new law carries into effect a policy which the supreme court approved in a recent decision.

TVA TO TAKE OVER PRIVATE UTILITY

NEW YORK, April 12.—(AP)—The contract for sale of Tennessee Electric Power Co. properties to Tennessee Valley Authority and various municipalities was completed today.

It approved by the parties affected, it will be formally signed with appropriate ceremonies June 20 in the Tennessee valley, company and TVA representatives announced.

As previously predicted TVA will pay Commonwealth & Southern Corp. about \$45,000,000 for the electric properties of Tennessee Electric Co., its subsidiary. Municipalities and a number of rural co-operatives will purchase local distribution systems for \$27,000,000, while miscellaneous adjustments will bring the basic purchase price of \$78,000,000 up to \$100,000,000.

Negotiations for the acquisition of TVA of the northern Alabama and Mississippi electric properties of C. & S. will probably begin in the next two weeks, it was said.
