## LOS ANGELES WINS 10TH STRAIGHT GAME

Sactus Post 2nd Triumph, Other 6 Clubs Stand at .500 Per Cent Each.

(By the Associated Press) Except for the top and bottom clubs, it was all squares in the Pacific coast baseball league today, with the six middle teams tied at .500 per cent and the Los Angeles Angels stepping out ahead of the pack with ten straight victories behind them.

While the cellar-spot Sacramento Senators won their second game of the season by nipping Hollywood again, 9 to 7, Los Angeles got hits when they counted and defeated Portland, 9-5, at Los Angeles.

The Los Angeles club, beaten only twice this year, sewed up the ball game in the sixth when Pitcher Stine smashed a homer with two on, sending Radonits from the Portland mound. The Angels hit Radonits and Birhofer for 12 hits, while Stine went up 11.

At Sacramento last night, the Senators drove Ardizola from the bill with a six-run surge in the second inning as they beat Hollywood.

The Senators nipped Ardizola and Osborne for 14 hits.

**Padres Nose Out Seals.**  
Third baseman Hanlin connected for a single with the bases loaded in the 10th inning to score Niemie and give the San Diego Padres a 7-to-6 win over the San Francisco club at San Diego. San Diego slugger blasted the offerings of Wilkie and Hallon for 17 hits. Berger, acquired by the Padres from St. Paul, hit a 400-foot homer in the eighth. There was no one on base.

Oakland scored three runs in the opening frame off Southpaw Walker and never relinquished the lead in beating Seattle at Oakland last night 9-4. Pickerei relieved Walker in the second, and Selway replaced Pickerei in the fifth. Selway pitched the full route for Oakland, giving up 14 hits.

Floyd Heikie, who joined San Francisco on option this spring, has been returned to Tacoma of the Western International league. Manager O'Doni said the southpaw's mound work was too erratic. Norbert Pfeiffer, outfielder, and Neil Clifford, catcher, went to Tacoma in the deal.

Farr will have a 19-pound advantage in weight. He tipped the scales at 205½ pounds and Burman at 186½.

## HEADLINERS SIGN FOR ROSEBURG CARD

Turner and Kanski Slated for Battle Here After Disputed Draw.

Pat Padelford, matchmaker for the American Legion post in connection with its boxing cards, returned from Portland Wednesday bearing contracts to guarantee the appearance here April 21 of Leo Turner, colored middleweight of Oakland, California, and Mike Kanski of Tacoma, as headliners for the forthcoming fight program.

Padelford went back to Portland today to complete other arrangements connected with the card.

Padelford reports that he had considerable difficulty in signing the match, as Freddie Steele, newly appointed matchmaker at Spokane, offered the boxers a much better proposition than Roseburg could afford to meet for a match on the same date set for the fight here.

Both men, however, had verbally agreed to battle at Roseburg on the 21st and stuck by their agreement, Padelford said.

They recently battled to a draw in Tacoma, where fans still are arguing over the decision.

The supporting card, Padelford reports, will feature Austin Pendergrass and Battling Juid in a six-round semi-final, a bout requested by both local battlers following their four-rounder on the last program.

Gene Mann of Roseburg, who made his first appearance in the local ring at the last fight, will be matched in a 4-round special event

with L. Crow of Portland. Carl Wassom, well known local athlete, will make his debut as a boxer in one of the preliminary bouts, providing a suitable opponent is found. Babe Fenton of Sutherlin, who is very popular with the local fans, also will be one of the preliminary fighters, although his opponent has not yet been selected.

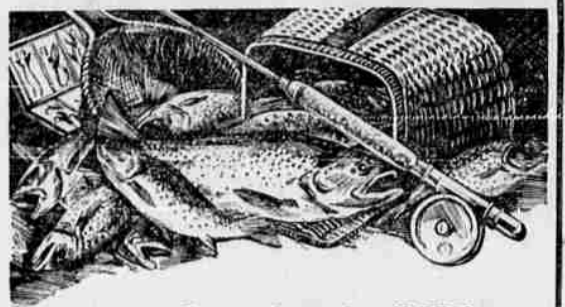

So hard pressed is Hayward that he has listed Captain George Yaroff and Rod Hansen, pole vaulters in the high jump, and Lloyd Dod and Harry Weston, hurdlers, in the shot.

## BEER WAR GOONS GET PRISON TERMS

STEVENSON, Wash., April 12.—(AP)—Indeterminate sentences of from 8 months to 5 years were meted James Scott and Jake Minsky yesterday. They were arrested on charges of complicity in a beer truck bombing here last year and were among the more than 100 defendants in the cleanup of Oregon labor terrorists.

Special Prosecutor Linville of Skamania county said the pair pleaded guilty about a year ago but were not immediately sentenced because they were in Oregon to answer other charges.
