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LET us just suppose for a moment that Chancellor Hitler and Premier Mussolini will accept President Roosevelt's offer to be the referee for the troubles and disagreements of Europe. We would then find ourselves head over heels involved in the affairs over there. The situation would not be unlike that of our previous attempt at peace making in Europe—but we had more justification then.

When President Wilson sat as a peace treaty maker he represented a country that had been a principle combatant in the war. To date this country has not been a party to the recent bloodless conflicts in Europe, that have altered the map more than the great war did.

But the dictators will not agree to President Roosevelt's proposal. Therefore the action may be evaluated on the basis of what will result rather than on what might have resulted.

The practical results will doubtless be to spotlight the dictators and their possible intentions for the benefit of the 31 small nations named in the non-aggression proposal. Naturally this will be of substantial aid to France and Britain in their efforts to form the others into an organization to block any further moves by Italy and Germany.

By sending the message to the dictators we have undoubtedly rendered a great service to our friends the democracies.

Though no one wants to see a war break out in Europe, we ordinary average Americans know that in this hostile world we must look out for our own welfare first. No one else is going to do that for us. A great many of us are therefore wondering how this recent effort of the President is going to help us keep at peace with the rest of the world.

TEACHER HELD FOR FATAL PADDLING

CLARENCE, Pa., April 14. (AP)—The supervision of the nearby Shiro school was held today for the second year after a physician testified a 10-year-old student who had been whipped died of a diabetic coma induced by shock.

The 27-year-old, hospitalized teacher, Harrison A. Hartman, did not testify at the magistrate's hearing on the charges of assault and manslaughter. He sat silently during the testimony of five witnesses and then returned to the school after arranging renewal of his \$5,000 bond.

Two classmates, Ronald Wilson and Richard Greenwalt, related Hartman caught them and the Wilson boy throwing jelly beans at a floating board shaped into a paddle about two feet long.

FRIDAY FIGHT CARD MAY END SEASON

Turner, Kanski Headline Punched, Expected to Stage Hot Battle.

Roseburg fight fans will have an opportunity to see one of the best cards of the season here Friday, April 21, at what is expected to be the last boxing program of the season, the local match makers, Pat Padelford and Rudy Ritzman, reported today.

Padelford has returned from Portland, where he spent several days last week completing details for the engagement.

Leo Turner and Mike Kanski, who are to be matched in the 10-round headline, are in hard training, Padelford reports. They recently fought a close draw in Tacoma, declared to be one of the best bouts of the season in that city.

Kanski is a hard puncher as well as a good boxer, and recently outpointed Ruddy Peterson, a recently middleweight champion, in a fight at Tacoma. Turner, in the opinion of local fans, was robbed in the verdict when he fought Peterson here recently, the majority of those in attendance believing that the Oakland colored boy clearly outboxed the title claimant.

Turner, who is a very fast boxer, has been gaining hitting power, and won his last fight by a knockout.

Padelford declared today that the main goal should furnish plenty of action.

In the semi-final, fans will see Austin Pendergast and Battling Judd, both of Roseburg, in a six-round engagement. They fought a four-round match on the last card, and neither was satisfied, requesting a return meeting over a longer period.

A good sustaining card of preliminaries has been arranged.

FLAG RACE BEGUN IN MAJOR LEAGUES

Yankees Battle Senators, Pirates Face Cincy in Day's Only Games.

NEW YORK, April 17.—(AP)—It's a long vista that stretches today before the major league baseball clubs—and if the fans who so eagerly turned their attention to the openings have predictions as to the finish, the managers for the most part haven't.

Of all the 16 pilots who have been anxiously peering toward the horizon, only two ventured today to forecast that the flags were theirs. And both claimed the same pennant.

Leo Hartnett, leader of the Chicago Cubs, and Bill Terry of the New York Giants spoke right out in meeting for the National league hunting.

The real surprise was the caution of McCarthy of the New York Yankees, whose blight readily accounted for the reticence of his fellow managers in the junior circuit.

After much prodding McCarthy admitted he had a chance. Two games were listed today to give the leagues a ceremonial launching of baseball's centennial year, with all hands swinging into action tomorrow. At Washington the Yankees and Senators had a date to face presidential pitching, and at Cincinnati, birthplace of professional baseball, the Reds and Braves were trying to get in a debut before the rising waters of the Ohio river took over the field.

Tomorrow the teams will line up this way: National league—Cincinnati at Chicago, St. Louis at Pittsburgh, New York at Brooklyn, Philadelphia at Boston.

BEARS' BOAT CREW BEATS WASHINGTON

BERKELEY, Calif., April 17.—(AP)—The University of California honored its crew as one of the greatest in history today following its seven-length victory Saturday over its traditional Pacific coast foe, the University of Washington Husky.

The Californians, sounding a warning to other national title contenders, licked the northerners for the first time in six years. The time for the three-mile grind was 14 minutes, 48.4 seconds, which trimmed more than five seconds off the mark set by Washington in 1931.

The California juniors defeated the Washington second-stringers over the same course in a photo finish, the first Jayvay victory for the Bears since 1934. The Husky freshmen salvaged a measure of satisfaction by whipping the California yearlings by seven lengths on the two-mile course.

R. H. S. TRACK TEAM WINS MEET, 68-54

Victory Surprising Because Posted on Less Than One Month's Practice.

Roseburg high school's track team, with less than a month of practice behind it, was forced to meet a strong cinder squad from Cottage Grove high school on their field in a last minute track meet Saturday afternoon because of a mixup of dates, and came off with a surprising 68-to-54 triumph. This was the first victory over the northwesterners in a number of years.

Cottage Grove amassed more first places than did the Indians, 8 to 5, with one tie, but it was the more evenly balanced Roseburg team which came through with a majority of second and third places which eventually decided the outcome of the meet. Both squads battled evenly throughout the first 12 events, tied at that mark at 50-40, with but the broad jump and relay remaining. The Indians swept all three places in the broad jump, for the only clean sweep of the meet, and went on to take the relay when Cottage Grove failed to enter a team.

Coach Jim Watts reported that some of the times and distances made were outstanding considering the fact that his team had had but little practice in the track events and practically none in the field events, and that the host's track was in poor shape.

Notable Performances Particularly outstanding was Tom Simon's 100-yard dash, which he ran in the fast time of 19.4. Other fine performances were made by Nordyke in the 220-yard dash and high jump, Byrd in the 120-yard high hurdle, Wimberly in the broad jump, and Carson and Jennings, both sophomores, in the shot and discus. Carson, who threw the shot and discus but once before in his life, placed in both events, and Jennings placed in the javelin and discus.

The next meet for the Indians will be the Hayward relay at Eugene this coming week-end. Coach Watts plans on entering the 440-yard, sprint medley and distance relays.

The Roseburg Pirates, local entry in the Southwestern Oregon Baseball league, played their first practice game of the season at Glendale Sunday. The regulars made a good start, shutting out the Glendale Loggers, 5 to 0, in the first three innings. After that time, however, numerous substitutions were made to try out prospective players, and Glendale emerged victorious, 12 to 5.

"Roseburg will have the finest team it has seen in many years," George Barr, manager, announced today, basing his prediction on the results of yesterday's game. "Our fielding was ragged, due largely to the numerous substitutions, but our hitting was unusually good and I am sure the Roseburg fans are going to be well pleased."

The Pirates and Glendale will play another practice game next Sunday, meeting at Finley field in Roseburg. A small admission will be charged to defray expenses.

General Try-Out Given

A large squad has been organized for this season, giving plenty of players from which to pick material for the season, Barr reports.

At Glendale yesterday Linden Hoffman and Loyal Goff worked behind the plate. Glen Levering of Sutherlin, Barr and La Von Baker took turns on the mound. Gene Tynan also is to be a pitcher for the Pirates but was not present yesterday. Baker, Gerald Williams of Sutherlin and Jay Cheney of Myrtle Creek alternated at first base. Bert Aycox of Sutherlin, Tom Herblison, and Fred Schermer worked at the keystone sack, with George Sanders holding down shortstop position and Billy Schermer taking the hot corner.

Barr was particularly impressed by the outfield, occupied by Elmer Hill, Jay Shinn and Sid Dominico, with Ray Morgan in reserve.

The Southwestern Oregon league is scheduled to open its season April 30. Roseburg's opponent is not yet definitely known, as the schedule has not been finally adopted.

LOS ANGELES RUNS WIN STREAK TO 15

The end of the second regular week of Pacific Coast league baseball left the high-flying Los Angeles Angels far above the pack today and plotting another series of victories at the expense of San Diego's just-so-so Padres.

Los Angeles, beaten only twice and with 15 straight victories, boosted its percentage to .882 yesterday with a 6-5 and 16-7 triumph over Portland, the first game a lull in the affairs and the second called at the end of the fifth because of darkness. The Angels thereby swept the series, 7 games to 0.

The Angels, who will play San Diego on the Los Angeles lot this week, overcame a 5-0 Portland lead in the sixth inning of the opener on a series of hits off Radonits, and then blasted three Beaver pitchers for a dozen runs in the first three innings of the nightcap. Portland made all seven runs in the fourth.

Seattle moved up behind Los Angeles with doubleheader victories over Oakland at the Oaks' park, 5-3 in the 12-inning first game and 4-1 in the nightcap. Gregory kept Oakland's 11 hits well scattered in the 12-game duel with Jack Sorenson, who was touched for four runs.

The winning runs came when Cocharat and White singled and came in on Strange's double.

Seattle's second-game triumph came on four runs in the final frame which overcame the Oaks' 1-0 lead. Webber held Oakland to three hits. Seattle won the local series, 5 games to 2, and will enter tonight's Hollywood this week.

At San Diego, San Francisco's Seals took the series from San Diego, 4 games to 3, by winning both ends of the twin bill, 2-1 in 10 innings and 4-0. Gibson, veteran Seals hurler, was credited with victory in the opener, though Balton took over in the tenth, and Southard held the Padres to two hits in the nightcap. Timely batwork by DiMaggio, Seals' centerfielder, figured in both wins.

Hollywood's Stars, somewhat dimmed in losing the series, 5 games to 2, to the up-and-coming Sacramento Senators, pulled out their only two wins of the series in taking yesterday's double bill, 12-2 and 6-4. Puncnett, Hollywood outfielder, whacked out home runs on three successive trips to the platter in the opener. Sacramento plays San Francisco at the Seals' stadium this week.

Heavyweight Champion Joe Louis remained an overwhelming favorite to beat Jack Roper back into the ash can of pugilists today as Los Angeles awaited the bell for their ten-round championship encounter at Wrigley field tonight.

Betting on the outcome, such as there is, found Louis a ten-to-one or better choice, with most of the wagering centered on how many rounds Roper will or will not last.

California's first heavyweight championship fight in 30 years and Los Angeles' first in history promised to be as colorful as it is brief. Upwards of 30,000 souls, among them the usual glamour boys and girls from Hollywood's film set dotting the ringside, were expected to witness the bout. A minimum of \$100,000 "gate" was expected, with Louis cutting 45 per cent and Roper a challenger's 10 per cent.

The big bout of the card was slated to go on at 10 p. m.

Louis, more methodic than brilliant in his training, was expected to scale around 200 pounds and Roper 197 when they weigh in at noon.
