

PROGRAM OF FIGHTS LISTS FINE PRELIMS

Card to Be Well Balanced
in Support of Turner—
Kanski Battle.

Preliminary bouts at Friday night's boxing card at the armory will include the 16-round main event in interest for local fans in the opinion of Pat Padelford, matchmaker. Altogether, Padelford declares, Friday night's card, expected to be the last for the season, is the best balanced to be seen in Roseburg for many years.

In the preliminary encounters, fans will see three local boys matched against Portland boxers in their respective weight divisions. Gene Mann of Roseburg, who made his debut on the last card, and showed fans some exceptional fast boxing and clever punching, will be pitted against Bud Cross of Portland in a four-round engagement. Both boys will tip the scales at 125 pounds.

RHS Griddle Billed
A great deal of local interest is being shown in the match between Carl Wasson, of Roseburg, who will fight Jimmie O'Brien of Portland. The fighters will weigh about 175 pounds.

Wasson is well known to local sports fans as the tough and rugged tackle on the Roseburg high school football team for the past several years. He is a very husky youngster and has had some experience as an amateur fighter. Friday night's event will be his first public appearance in the squared circle. He has been working out regularly in preparation for the bout and is reported to have greatly increased his hitting power. He gives every indication of becoming a top notch fighter if he continues in that profession.

Taber Fenton, the speedy Sutherland lightweight, who has delighted fans with his clever work on the last two cards, has exhausted possibilities for local opponents, and is to be matched against Carl Pinkerton of Portland on Friday night's program, completing the boxing preliminaries.

Main Go Promises Heat
The main event Friday night will feature Leo Turner, colored middleweight of Oakland, California, against Mike Kanski of Tacoma, in which is expected to be a whizzer of a 16-round bout. Turner came in to immediate popularity with local fans when he recently fought Bud Peterson, northwest middleweight champion, in the local arena. Fans expressed vehement disapproval of the verdict awarding the bout to Peterson, as it was the general opinion that Turner's speedy boxing gave him a clear margin over the champion. Since his fight here with Peterson, Turner is reported to have considerably increased his hitting power and is considered a dangerous slugger as well as a very speedy and shifty boxer.

Kanski, who fought a draw with Turner at Tacoma recently, is the slugging type of fighter who always pleases fans, according to reports. He and Turner have both been training seriously for their meeting here and are said to be in top condition.

The feud between Battling Judd and Austin Fendergrass, which brought them together for a four-round preliminary bout on the last card, will put them in the semi-final spot for six rounds Friday night. Both are well known to local fans and, with a private grudge to be settled, they are expected to furnish plenty of excitement.

ARCHIBALD WINS "FEATHER CROWN"

PROVIDENCE, R. I., April 19.—(AP)—Little Joey Archibald, newly crowned king of the featherweights, set out today to see what can be done about cashing in on his hard-earned 126-pound title.

Victor in 15 rounds of rough if not savage dueling with Leo Rodak of Chicago, Archibald, who once studied for the priesthood and who was a regular student at Providence college until the chance came for him to get into the boxing money, holds undisputed possession of the crown relinquished last year by the then three-time champion, Henry Armstrong.

Not everybody in the crowd of 5,500 that saw the first championship ship match staged in Rhode Island,

thought Archibald won, but it was the consensus of newspaper writers that the Providence battler had a slight edge most of the way, and clinched the fight by wading in and taking the final round.

PORTLAND BEATEN BY OAKLAND, 5 TO 2

Los Angeles Wins No. 16 in
Row in 11-Inning Game
With San Diego.

Homecoming day crowds of 15,000 at Seattle and 11,300 at Portland saw their respective Pacific Coast League baseball clubs win and lose yesterday. Seattle beat Hollywood 7-5, but Portland dropped a 5-2 game to Oakland.

While the first place Los Angeles Angels were pulling out a 5-to-4 win over San Diego to make it straight victory number 16, Barrett, Seattle's veteran right hander, pitched smooth ball and connected at bat to keep the Rainiers in second place.

Barrett was touched for 14 hits, but kept them well scattered. Seattle got 11 off four Hollywood pitchers. Barrett hit a double and knocked in two runs. He was replaced in the ninth by Turpin.

Portland scored twice in the opening frame as Outfielder Coleman slammed out a homer with one on, but Oakland talked once in that inning, sent three runs across the plate in the fourth and another in the eighth to sew up the ball game.

Cantwell pitched a full-time job for Oakland, giving up only seven hits, while Portland used Leska, Barrow and Newsum at the Oaks got 13.

At Los Angeles, the circuit-leading Angels went 11 innings to nip the hard-fighting San Diego Padres. The victory boosted the Los Angeles percentage to .889, and the winning streak is now three victories short of the league record of 19 set in 1903 by Seattle.

At San Francisco last night, the Giants, rallying in the ninth, nipped Sacramento, 6-5. Holder singled off Keller in the final frame to score Jennings.

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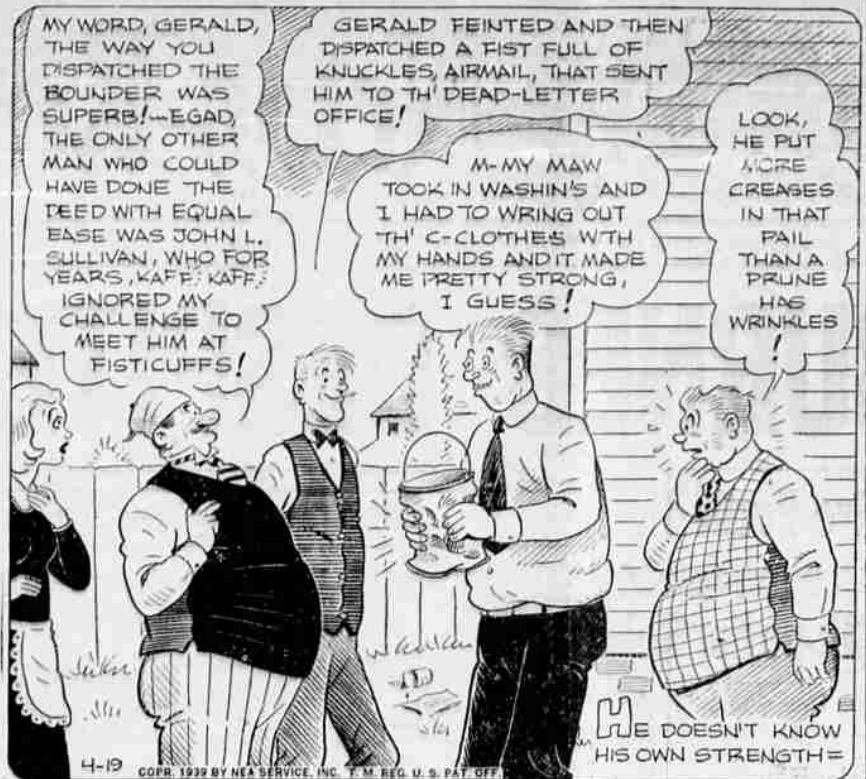


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DAR HEAD EXPLAINS BAN ON SONGSTRESS

No Question of Prejudice
Involved in Negroes' Case, Assertion.

WASHINGTON, April 18.—(AP)—Mrs. Henry M. Robert, Jr., president general of the Daughters of the American Revolution, said today "there was no question of prejudice, personality or discrimination" involved in the D. A. R.'s refusal to let Marian Anderson, negro contralto, sing in Constitution hall.

Prominent musicians and organizations over the country protested when the singer was denied use of the D. A. R. auditorium here and she sang before an estimated 75,000 persons on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial, Easter Sunday. Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt and several other women resigned from the D. A. R. following its action in the Anderson case.

Mrs. Robert told 3,000 delegates and members at the D. A. R.'s annual meeting that the national board of management, of which 41 members, from all sections of the country were present, voted for several reasons that no exception should be made for the Easter concert to the society's rule against negro artists.

"That rule arose," the president general said, "because of unpleasant experiences in attempting to go contrary to conditions and customs existing in the District of Columbia."

Agreements at Stake.
She said another factor involved was that an exception would have been "in direct contradiction to existing agreements with the concert bureaus who have regularly used the hall for some years and whose agreements cover a period of years." She did not discuss details of the agreements.

"The membership should also understand," Mrs. Robert said, "that to have made an exception would have meant that the society retreated under fire of widely scattered groups and organizations, many of whom knew nothing of the facts."

The question involved, not a single artist, but far-reaching racial forces," the president general declared.

"This is not a question for the Daughters of the American Revolution to solve alone," she said. "When the community at large has worked out its problem the D. A. R. will be willing at all times to adopt its policies to practices and customs in accordance with the highest standards of the community."

"The society has consistently, through its nearly 50 years been a friend of, and has worked for, many minority groups. It will continue to do so."

Mrs. Robert did not use Marian Anderson's name in her report.

MOUNTAIN STATES CUTS POWER RATES

SALEM, April 18.—(AP)—Mountain States Power company customers in the Coon Bay area will receive rate reductions totaling \$32,000 a year, the public utilities commissioner said today.

Residential rates, effective with May meter readings, will be cut \$22,000 a year. Commercial rate reductions, totaling \$9,000 a year, will be effective with June meter readings.

The company also said it would reduce rates June 1 in its Tillamook and Willamette districts, but did not announce how great the reductions would be.

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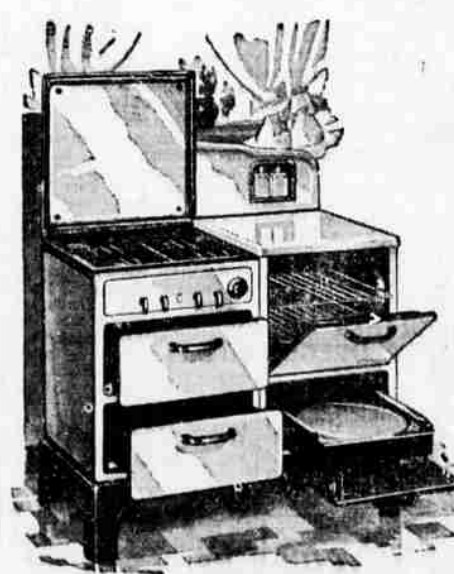
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
