Of late years there has been considerable talk about youth and the increasing importance of younger people in both business and politics. Some businessmen, large employers, began drawing the employment age line at 40. An organization in New England of unemployed men over 40 has been formed to combat this tendency—and, by the way, it has been remarkably successful.

The energy and vitality of young people are great assets. If to those qualities could be added, in the majority of cases, a little more of the balanced judgment found more generally in those possessed of a decade or two more experience, the combination would be unbeatable.

With all due respect to the 99 per cent who are excellent citizens, the daily front pages of the newspapers hand a hard jolt to the theory that the world is to be saved by the power of youth. Most of the crimes in this country are committed by persons under 30 years of age. And most of the crimes are exceedingly foolish and demonstrate an appalling lack of judgment.

Read the silly details of the miniature crime wave conducted by the six young people who were arrested in Boise this week—three girls and three youths. That series of escapades was not necessarily typical. There is no type for such things. The only true-to-form part of the performance was the obvious fact that they had no thought beyond the present. Doubtless by now they are wondering why they did not think about the possible consequences before they started out. They have learned something by experience, but their knowledge is too late to do them any good. They have wrecked their lives. Practically the same comment can be made about other young people who commit crimes.

Of course to indict all youth because of the escapades of a sadly erratic few is not fair. But there has been a tendency in late years to condemn all older people as unfit because a few in the classification fail. One point of view is as far wrong as the other.

There is a remarkable balance in humanity. All ages contribute their share in the total scheme. However our modern idea of almost freedom for youth and the emphasis on self-determination is fraught with danger. It is still the duty of the older people to impart as much as possible to the younger people, the benefits of experience and judgment gained through having lived more years. The youngsters may not like it. They may not believe what they are told. They may resent such suggestions as being old-fashioned. Nevertheless the effort must go on—or else.

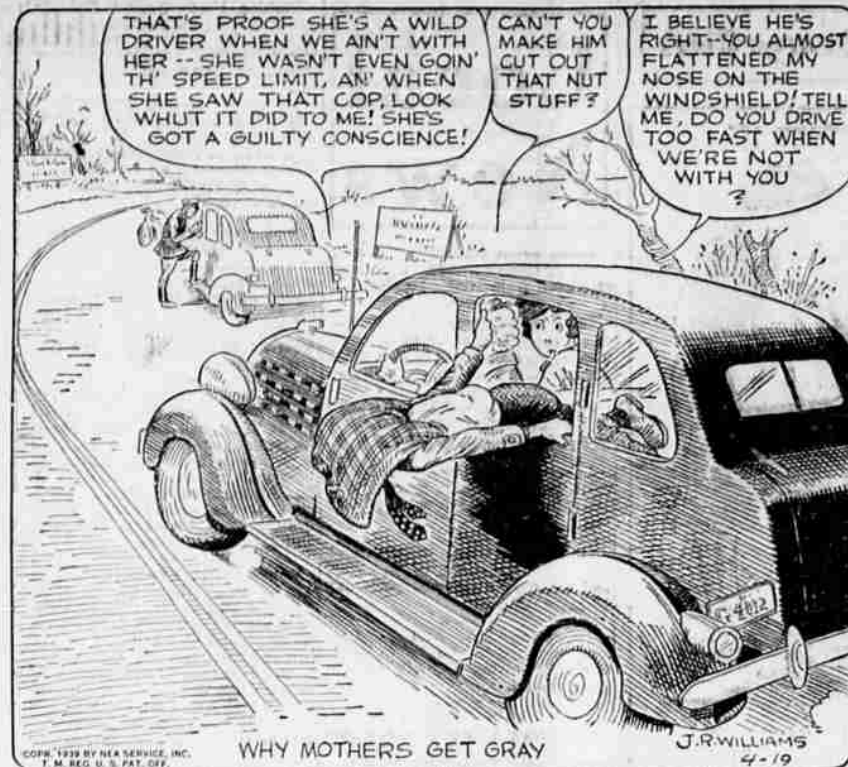

RECALL OF ENVOY

KENNEDY ADVISED

NEW YORK, April 19.—(AP)—Former Governor Philip La Follette of Wisconsin recommended the recall of Joseph P. Kennedy as ambassador to Great Britain in a speech last night in which he assailed "nazism" as the gravest danger ever to confront America.

"Eloquent tributes to democracy here in America can be largely nullified, if our representatives abroad by daily, public conduct support those forces in Europe least concerned about democracy," La Follette told a banquet of the Economic club.

"Speaking for myself alone, I do not hesitate to say the president would perform a public service if he immediately recalled our ambassador to Great Britain and replaced him with the best Benjamin Franklin he can find."

The former governor, head of the progressive third party movement, praised President Roosevelt's peace appeal to Hitler and Mussolini but continued an alliance with Great Britain and France, would subject the United States "to the gravest risks."

La Follette, who returned recently from a three-month tour of seven European nations, said government cliques in France and Great Britain had helped drive democracy out of Germany by giving "nazism" substantial "aid and comfort" until at least four weeks ago.

This aid, he said, was based on a selfish fear that Germany might turn from "nazism" to communism and war might bring revolution in Britain and France.

WESTERN FARMERS' INCOMES INCREASE

Receipts in 11 States in First 2 Months of '39 Show Fine Outlook.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 19.—(AP)—The tide of fortune appeared today to have finally turned in favor of the far western farmers. They got \$128,104,000, for farm products sold in the first two months of this year. That was more than the \$126,495,000 the department of agriculture estimated they took in last year in the like two months.

It was the first time since the decline in farmer income started around the end of 1937 that the western farmers got more aggregate pay for what they sold than in the like period of the preceding year.

Six of the 11 far western states bettered the 1938 aggregate. They were Washington, Nevada, Utah, Idaho, Wyoming and Montana.

Income of farmers of Washington, Utah and Montana was higher this year in both January and February.

Arizona, California, New Mexico, Colorado and Oregon had smaller incomes for the two months this year than last, though Oregon income in January was bigger than a year ago.

The farmers contributed considerably more to the national wealth of foodstuffs and fabrics than their income showed. That was because the volume of their marketings increased far more than the aggregate price paid for it, an average prices were around 10 per cent less than a year ago.

Farmers of the 11 western states got virtually 13 per cent of the total national farm income for the two months.

Washington's relatively strong farmer income position resulted principally from larger sums taken in from sale of wheat and apples. Wheat also brought more money to Montana.

Dairy products brought lower returns in all 11 states. Live-stock farmers brought less money to Oregon and California, but more in Wyoming.

On the whole the west's income from crops made a better showing than that from livestock, gaining 13 per cent, while stock and allied products brought 6 per cent less.

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CIVIL RIGHTS LAW ENFORCEMENT URGE

WASHINGTON, April 19.—(AP)—Attorney General Murphy asked federal district attorneys today to enforce civil rights statutes vigorously, declaring until recently these laws "have been practically a dead letter."

Murphy said in an address prepared for the first conference of United States attorneys' enforcement should be "not just for some of the people, but all of them, in every walk of life, in every crowd, in every political faith."

He said the new civil liberties unit of the department of justice would assist the attorneys.

The attorney general emphasized independence as an important characteristic of a federal prosecutor.

"We have all been shocked by the isolated instances of political contacts and other improprieties that from time to time have come to light," he said. "But they have not harmed the judicial system and they need not do so."

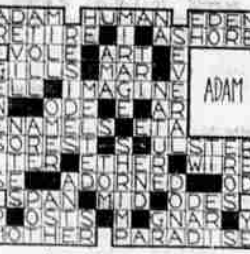
