It has taken a little time to get this information on proper authority. It was located in a book entitled "The Hoover Administration"

"In the efforts to reduce appropriations the salaries of federal officials and employees had been cut. Naturally, the pay of the officials whose compensation under the constitution could not be diminished was not affected, but the President (Hoover), although according to the constitution his salary could neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he may have been elected, informed the economy committee that he would voluntarily permit back to the treasury 20 per cent of his salary if congress would pass the necessary legislation authorizing its acceptance by the treasury. Such a provision was included in the 1932 economy act. As a matter of general interest the fact here may be mentioned that Mr Hoover throughout his public career never used any of the salary paid him as a public official for his personal purposes, but always applied such money to public service or to charity."

The President of the United States is a hard worked man and earns every cent he is paid. Doubtless Mr. Hoover would be the last person to advocate free services—the point in his case was that he had with his engineering ability made enough money for his own use and regarded his public service as a contribution to his government which he determined to make without personal gain.

Unlucky Rescue

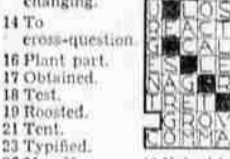
RURAL HALL, N. C.—It wasn't that he searched the ditches out of Constable J. T. Spainhour so much as the company he kept that got this driver into trouble.

OREGON'S EXHIBIT BIG FAIR MAGNET

SAN FRANCISCO, April 19.—(AP)—Nearly half a million persons were estimated today to have visited the presentations of Oregon and Washington at the Golden Gate International exposition on Treasure Island.

P. E. Healy, manager of the Washington exhibit, said 428,449 had been "clocked" and 27,888 had signed the register.

Keith Southard, manager of the Oregon display, said "well over 200,000 would be a most conservative estimate" for his exhibit room.

The latter said, too, that because Oregon also had an outdoor display of wild life and four separate doors to the exhibits room it was impossible to gauge accurately the number of persons viewing the state's offerings. Thousands pass the outdoor presentation daily.

The exhibits of the two northwestern states are in the hall of western states neighboring displays of Idaho, Montana, Utah, Nevada, Arizona and California. The Colorado exhibit is held open week-end. Missouri and Illinois have separate buildings.

Southard said Governor Charles Sprague of Oregon would attend an Oregon day program on Treasure Island July 5. The Washington day ceremonies, Healy said, will be held on some date between June 15 and July 1, with Governor Clarence Martin in attendance.

Both exhibits managers said comments of visitors had been "excellent."

The Washington chieftain said a 4 by 6 foot piece of plywood bearing "greetings to our sister exhibit" would be sent to the Washington display at the New York world's fair.
