HEALTH ASSOCIATION DINNER HELD FRIDAY AT HOTEL UMPQUA

The Douglas County Public Health association met Friday evening at a six-thirty o'clock dinner meeting at the Hotel Umpqua with Attorney Thomas C. Hartnell, president, in charge. Mrs. Robert Mercer and Mrs. Earl Wiley, two of the seven delegates to the annual meeting of the Oregon State Tuberculosis association held in Eugene, gave short reports. Dr. Floyd DeCamp, director of Oral Health of the Oregon State Board of Health, was the principle speaker of the meeting.

Dr. DeCamp discussed the dental survey which has been made throughout the state with the cooperation of local dentists in each community, calling attention to the fact that 1228 children have been thus examined in Douglas county within recent weeks and referred to their family dentists for correction.

He stressed the fact that the old adage that a mother loses a tooth with every child born need no longer hold true if the mother's teeth are protected by proper diet and frequent dental examinations. Children may build good teeth if they are given early diet to this end. Even as early as two years the habit of regular dental visits should be established. A survey of three hundred children under a controlled diet of sweets showed the effect of sugar and the resulting tooth decay. An interesting point was mentioned by Dr. DeCamp when he related his experience with a group of farmers where enamel made from beet tops was commonly fed the cattle. They learned that within four years these cattle had to be sold because of the decay that had occurred in their teeth which were decayed down to the gums. This was attributed by the farmers to the large amount of sugar in the ensilage.

He emphasized the fact that dental disease does not stop in the mouth but has far reaching effects in the body.

From this most specialized phase of public health Dr. DeCamp discussed in a more general way. He mentioned that seventy thousand people die every year from pneumonia and influenza and thousands of children die every year in the United States of diphtheria, scarlet fever, measles, or whooping cough. He emphasized the fact that there is no excuse for a case of diphtheria as everyone knows the means of protection but are not using the implements of protection at hand.

The state of Oregon is expending seven cents per capita on public health; other states spend from \$4.50 to \$1.10. "Public health is like religion," stated the doctor, "it is a necessity. It is an occupation of saving lives."

He pointed out the fact that public health officers are not engaged in the treatment of disease. Our county has had in recent months both a dental and a hearing survey—means of bringing to the attention of the parents the necessity of correction which is then cared for by the family dentist or physician. In closing he stated, "Public health is bigger than any one organization or any one person. It has a definite place in American life."
