MARY JOAN PARKINSON HAS PART IN PLAY AT STEPHENS COLLEGE MONDAY

COLUMBIA, Missouri — Working directly under the supervision of Miss Maud Adams, professor of drama at Stephens college, Miss Mary Joan Parkinson appeared April 24th as Scribe in Dan Totherich's famous Chinese plays, "The Lost Prince and the Stolen Princess."

Miss Adams is producing the two plays as a single two-act drama, and is using the traditional Chinese stage settings and devices for her scenery—such as a roll of cloth across the stage as a river and a table as a mountain. The plays call for much pantomime and are similar to the newer American theater techniques.
