COAST GETS SIX NEW RADIO BEACONS

SAN FRANCISCO, April 25.—(AP)—Air navigation facilities have been greatly increased by the installation of six new radio marker beacons on the Pacific coast. S. V. Hall, United Air Lines' division manager of operations announced today.

The new markers, placed on high terrain, shoot a fan-shaped stream of radio signals straight into the air. Placed so planes flying along the radio beam course pass through it, the upward line of signals identifies the exact position for the pilot and are said not to be susceptible to static interference.

The markers are located at Hobart and Park Lane in Washington, and Bay Point, Livermore, La Habra, and Newhall Pass, in California.

The civil aeronautics authority has added to the facilities of United Air Lines' Pacific coast airways six new radio range stations during the past three months. The stations are located at Etnel, Washington; Eugene and Arlington, Oregon; Fort Jones, Red Bluff and Los Angeles, California.

REGRETS OFFERED TO U. S. DIPLOMAT

LONDON, April 25.—(AP)—The London Daily Express editorially offered regrets today to United States Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy for an anti-Catholic outburst last Friday at Edinburgh when the envoy was given freedom of the city.

The editorial referred to a woman's cry of "no popery!" from the gallery of Usher hall while Kennedy, a Catholic, was speaking. "The whole public will regret the discourtesy," the American ambassador, the editorial continued.
