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Oregonians may be assured that great care is taken at the Nyssa factory to make sugar of the highest possible standard. Chemists and technical experts test every step of the sugar-making process to make the final product as near perfect as possible. More than 500 chemical and polarographic determinations are made each 24 hours for guidance of factory operation and prevention of losses. In addition to these control tests, the quality of finely-granulated sugar is subjected to rigid tests. The result is an Oregon product which is the equal of any sugar, regardless of where it is refined, or from what source it comes.

Some people still feel there is some difference in quality between beet and cane sugar. This is unfounded. Pure sugar may be obtained from beets, cane, palm trees, maple trees, watermelons or from other sources. When it is refined, the difference is entirely mistaken and has long since been disproved by science and by practical experience. Pure gold comes from various ores. Pure sugar can be extracted from sugar beets, as well as from other sources. Maple sugar has a distinctive flavor because maple products, other than sugar, have not been removed from it. Refining maple sugar completely and it becomes pure, white sparkling sugar, identical with sugar from beets or cane.

"By no chemical test can the pure crystallized sugar from these different sources be distinguished," states the department of agriculture (bulletin 253). That pure maple, pure beet and pure cane sugars are identical has been confirmed extensively by government chemists, agricultural colleges, cooking teachers, dietitians, physicians and notably by large manufacturers of canned goods, candy, bakery products, confections, jellies and preserves.

GRANT LAND POLICY CHANGE APPROVED

WASHINGTON, April 26.—(AP)—Chairman Doremus (D., La.) of the House public lands committee will ask the house to consider a bill providing for forest management of the old Coos Bay wagon road grant lands of western Oregon through a measure approved by the committee.

The bill also revamps the fiscal setup of the lands, which reverted to government ownership years ago when the road terms were violated. Under the new plan, counties involved would receive 75 per cent of the land revenue in lieu of taxes and the remaining 25 per cent would be spent for administration.

PENSION PROPOSAL ELECTION ASSURED

SACRAMENTO, Calif., April 26.—(AP)—Hain's pension plan advocates succeeded today in qualifying sufficient signatures on an initiative petition to assure submission of the \$20-a-week Thursday proposal to the voters at the next general election providing the governor does not call a special election before that time.

The secretary of state's office recorded today a total of 233,627 signatures. The law requires only 212,117 names to qualify the petition. The "30-a-week Thursday" plan was defeated at the election last November.

CALIFORNIA AREA BATTLES HOPPERS

COALINGA, Calif., April 25.

(AP)—As farmers in western Fresno and Kern counties continued today to wage unceasing battle against billions of grasshoppers threatening their crops, residents of the newly established town of Avenal in the Kings county foothills started battling the advance guard of the horde that had been held successfully at the edge of the town for the last several days.

By midmorning hoppers were climbing onto porches and feeding on lawns, shrubs and trees. Many residents had taken the precaution to cover their greenery with mosquito netting but in a short time the netting in turn was covered by hoppers.

In the meantime the Avenal fire department and county agricultural forces continued their battle against the invasion by burning dry grass on all sides and spreading a ring of poison around the town. Home owners, having tightly closed their doors and windows, were out on the lawns and streets with hand sprays of all descriptions sprinkling crawling masses of insects with whatever sprays happened to be available for domestic insect control.

ROOSEVELT SIGNS AIR BASE MEASURE

WASHINGTON, April 25.—(AP)—President Roosevelt signed into law today a bill authorizing a \$200,000,000 naval air base program—the navy's share of the special emergency defense plan. Under its provisions, the navy can establish a far-flung chain of naval bases in Alaska, the mid-Pacific, Puerto Rico and the con-

tinental United States. Informal legislators said funds would be sought immediately to carry out the work.

Shortly before the president acted the senate passed and sent to him for his approval another defense measure—a \$508,789,824 appropriation for army defense activities in the next fiscal year beginning July 1.

LAND GRADING MEETING HELD

GLENDALE, April 26.—A meeting was held in the city hall in Glendale on Saturday, April 22 for the purpose of classifying land in the Oak Creek watershed (1) primarily suitable for timber production, (2) forest land suitable for permanent or semi-permanent joint use of timber production and grazing, and (3) land primarily suitable for grazing or agriculture. Mr. J. C. Moore, land use consultant, and J. Roland Parker, county agent, conducted the meeting. Other members of the committee were Mr. Kenneth Murdock, who represented the state forestry board, Mr. Shattley, who represented the re-invested O & C lands, J. C. Hutchison, county commissioner, and Fred Southwick, of the state fire patrol. Local members included A. G. Clarke, P. R. Cunningham, W. B. Garrett and O. G. Sether.

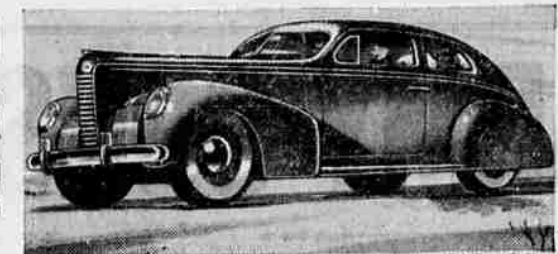

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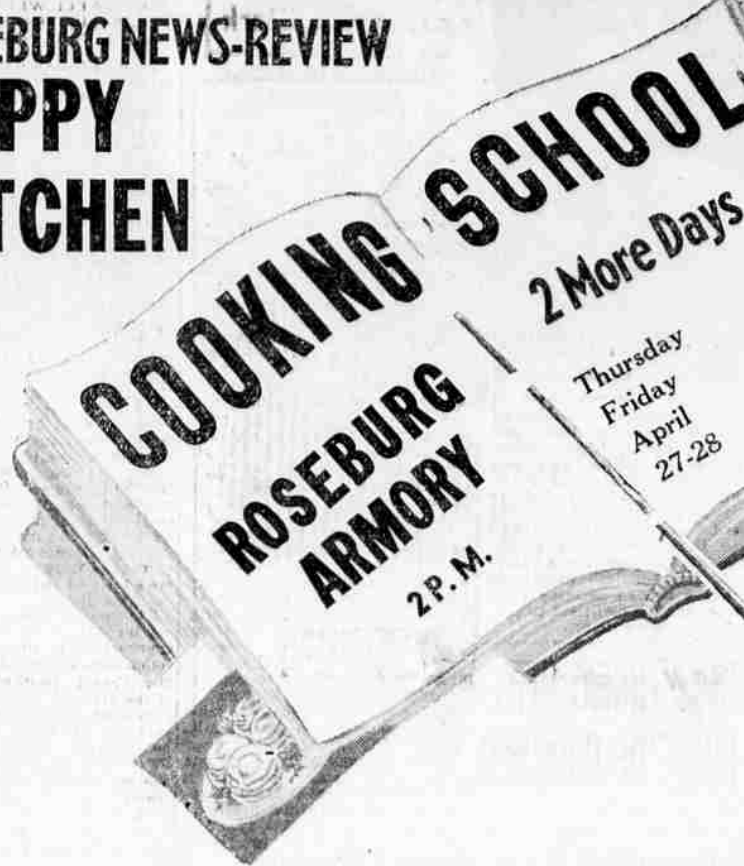
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
