INTEREST BEING SHOWN IN CHILD WELFARE WORK

Interest of the American Legion Auxiliary's one-half million members is being centered on the welfare of American children during April, according to Mrs. Ned Dixon, child welfare chairman of Umpqua unit of the auxiliary here. April is child welfare month in the auxiliary's calendar of activities, when special emphasis is given to the organization's child welfare work and when plans are developed for the year's efforts in behalf of needy children.

The auxiliary's efforts are being centered on three subjects this year, explained Mrs. Dixon:

1. Conservation of the child's own home for the child, through improved use of the aid to dependent children under the social security act.
2. Eradication of congenital syphilis, through proper medical tests and treatment of expectant mothers.
3. Prevention of contagious diseases to assure child health, through development of preventive medical practice as outlined in the "Indiana plan."

The American Legion is working jointly with the Legion Auxiliary in this program, which is being extended throughout the nation. Interest and cooperation of other organizations is being sought. Medical men, within and without the Legion, are giving their help in many communities.

"It is clearly understood that the program for April goes far beyond the confines of the thirty days of this month," said Mrs. M. K. Elbertson, national child welfare chairman. "It is our job in the weeks that are to come to do all in our power to follow through on this three-phase program. Merely to believe a child's home should be preserved for him, only to acknowledge that expectant mothers should have pre-natal examination for syphilis and treatment if blood tests are positive, simply to think that contagious diseases should be controlled is not enough. We must secure definite data and reliable information; we must spread the word; we must secure the cooperation of individuals and groups, and actuate our beliefs promptly and intelligently."

Recipes for Tasty Meals Offered Housewives By Homemaking Expert

At the News-Review cooking school today, Miss Barbara Miller, home economist, presented for the information of housewives of Douglas county many interesting recipes and cooking hints. Among today's recipes were the following:

OVEN DINNER

Roast leg of lamb, baked carrots, baked string beans, brown potatoes.

Leg of Lamb

Leg of lamb, clove of garlic, salt, pepper, 3 tbs. Umpqua Chief flour, 1 tbs. butter, 1 cup water, Tabasco sauce.

Method: Wipe leg of lamb. Cut garlic and rub over meat. Make a paste of butter, Umpqua Chief flour and seasoning. Rub over leg of lamb. Roast in shallow pan adding water and dash Tabasco sauce. Roast at 325 degrees, 25 min. per lb.

Baked Carrots and Baked String Beans and Brown Potatoes.

Prepare vegetables, cutting into uniform pieces. Place in utensil, add 1 to 2 cups of water, salt and butter. Cover and cook with roast.

Peel potatoes, dip in melted Crisco and place around roast. Season with salt, pepper, paprika.

Guttard Prize Chocolate Cake.

Two and one-half cups sifted Umpqua Chief flour, 2 tbs. baking powder, 1 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. cinnamon, 1 cup Crisco, 1 cup Guttard chocolate, 2 cups White Satin sugar, 4 eggs, 1 tsp. vanilla, 1-1/3 cups Rosebush Dairy milk.

Method: Sift flour, salt, cinnamon, baking powder and Guttard's chocolate. Cream Crisco and sugar. Beat eggs in one at a time. Add dry ingredients alternately with milk. Bake in layer cake pans at 325 degrees. For layer cake bake from 25 to 30 min. Or bake in square cake pan at 325 degrees from 45 to 50 min.

Chocolate Cake Frosting.

One-half cup Guttard chocolate, 2 cups White Satin sugar, 2 tbs. Umpqua Chief flour, 2-1/2 cups Rosebush Dairy milk, 4 tbs. butter, 2 tsp. vanilla, few grains of salt.

Method: Flour, sugar, salt and chocolate. Add milk slowly and stir until dissolved. Cook mixture slowly until it forms a soft ball when tried in cold water or 231 degrees. Add butter and vanilla, cool and beat until thick enough to spread. If it becomes too stiff, spread over hot water.

Cardinal Salad.

One package lemon gelatin, 1 cup boiling water, 2 cup beet juice, 3 tbs. vinegar, 1 tsp. salt, 2 tsp. grated onion, 1 tbs. Blue Bell horseradish mustard, 1 cup chopped
