GROWERS URGED TO ATTEND PRUNE MEET

The executive committee of the Oregon state grange is urging all prune growers to attend the hearing in Salem May 5 on a proposal to establish a prune marketing agreement, including the fixing of prices, Fred A. Goff, of Roseburg, a member of the grange state committee, said today.

"The Oregon State Grange consistently has urged cooperative marketing agreements and other acts as the only solution to the problem of assuring a fair return to the producer and an equitable price to the consumer," Mr. Goff declared.

"We feel that the prune grower is entitled to a reasonable profit, and believe that his position may at least be considerably bettered if control of prices is permitted, thus removing the crop from speculation."

"For this reason the executive committee of the state grange is urging as many growers as possible to attend the meeting to be held in Salem where a plan for a marketing agreement will be discussed."

JAPS SEND MORE TROOPS TO CHINA

PEIPING, April 27.—(AP)—The Japanese army announced today that additional troops were being landed in the vicinity of Tientsin "in considerable numbers" for use on various north China fronts against irregulars.

AIR TRAGEDY PILOT LOSES CERTIFICATE

Chas. B. Stead Blamed for Point Reyes Crash That Cost Five Lives.

WASHINGTON, April 27.—(AP)—The civil aeronautics authority today revoked the airline pilot certificate of Charles B. Stead, veteran pilot who had been charged by the authority with responsibility for the loss of an airliner off Point Reyes, Calif., last Nov. 29.

At the same time, the authority restored the dispatchers' certificates of Thomas P. Van Cleave and Philip S. Showalter, United Air lines dispatchers at Oakland. Their certificates had been suspended during the inquiry, but the CAA cleared them of any failure to perform their duties adequately.

The CAA sustained in full the report of Vice Chairman Harlow Branch, who conducted hearings at San Francisco. Branch did not participate in the final action of the authority.

The authority dismissed all the exceptions filed in behalf of Stead. He insisted that faulty radio reception was responsible for his failure to reach Oakland.

"The authority said 'the very fact of such difficulties in reception should have required Captain Stead to exercise more care than he did.'"

Stead and one passenger were rescued after the plane made a forced landing. Three passengers and two members of the crew lost their lives.

The ruling said Stead flew for an hour and 20 minutes solely on a compass course, and added:

"Under these circumstances the proper performance of his duty required him to determine with the greatest possible accuracy his position with relation to Oakland, both as to direction and distance by the standard orientation procedure."

The revocation was the first of an airline pilot certificate by the authority.
