JUST by way of bolting down
speculation as to what Herr Hit-
ler will say in his speech tomorrow,
let's list some of the various pos-
sible tones it may take.

(1) He may talk peace, may de-
clare innocence and appeal for
world goodwill for the Rome-Berlin
axis.

(2) He may bluster and threaten
and denounce all and sundry, in-
cluding the United States, laying
the blame for a war, that he may
imply to be in the offing, upon his
enemies.

(3) He may issue a challenge.
That is, he may state what he in-
tends to do and in the same breath
order his troops to carry out the
intent instantly. He is one who loves
dramatic surprises.

(4) He may confine his speech
largely to answering President
Roosevelt's note, showering con-
demnation on the president and up-
on this country, without dealing
directly with the things people
want most to know about his in-
tentions.

(5) Or he may just blunder. That
is he may make his usual rousing
speech about the greatness of his
people and how he has led them
toward success as a nation and
how they are all for him.

Unfortunately, a declaration of
innocence if that is his theme, will
not be taken seriously. Or to put it
bluntly—no one outside Germany
will believe it. There is always the
chance, however, that he may be
ready to declare an armistice for
quite a period.

The blustering and threatening
possibility seems to be the most
likely of the five listed above.
There would be between the lines,
in a speech that would be thus
classified, the idea that war is com-
ing but that Hitler would endeavor
to place the blame for it on his op-
ponents.

The ruler who ducks the blame
for any conflict will have better
support of the folks who have to do
the fighting and dying, than the
ruler who is considered, by his own
people, to be guilty of projecting a
conflict.

The least likely possibility, it
seems to this editor, would be a
speech that could be classified un-
der number three above. That kind
of talk would probably mean war
and would come pretty close to
making Hitler the aggressor.

So long as we are engaging in
guessing, this writer hazards a
guess that the speech will fall into
the group of utterances covered by
number four. It will be quite safe
for the next head man to say no
unpleasant things about the
United States and President Roose-
velt. It will not only be safe but in
that way he can make a great
amount of bold rough talk that will
tend to make his people very proud
of him without arousing their fears.

But all this guessing is an out
and out waste of time. The subject
happens to be the one most talked
of now so we have injected our two
cents worth. The fireflies, pool
rooms and corner stores will dis-
cuss and settle the matter during
the next 24 hours.
