AUXILIARY HAS FIDAC REPORT

The absorption of Czechoslovakia by Germany has lowered the flag of one of the countries associated in Fidac, the International Veterans Federation, according to Mrs. Thos. Parkinson, Fidac chairman of Uniqua unit of the American Legion auxiliary. Czechoslovakia is a veteran's organization, were members of Fidac and women's auxiliary organizations members of the Fidac auxiliary. What the future of their affiliation with Fidac will be is not known, Mrs. Parkinson said.

During the World war, Czechoslovakia was under the Austrian empire and its men were mobilized as part of the Austrian army but deserted in large numbers to the allied forces, she explained. A Czechoslovakian army was formed in Russia and fought with great distinction for the allied cause. Its retreat across Siberia after the Russian collapse is one of the most heroic stories of the war. Other Czechoslovakian forces served with the French and Italian armies. Thus, although Czechoslovakia did not become an independent country until after the war, it contributed to the allied victory and its veterans were eligible for Fidac membership.

The Czechoslovakian veterans have always taken a very active part in Fidac. The Fidac congress was held in Prague in 1931, and the country was studied that year by the women of the auxiliary as part of their Fidac program. Other countries associated in Fidac are the United States, Great Britain, France, Belgium, Italy, Yugoslavia, Poland, Rumania, Portugal and Greece.
