

SYSTEM OF SUPER HIGHWAYS ADVISED

Congress Given Roosevelt Request Based on Road Bureau's Report.

WASHINGTON, April 27.—(AP)—President Roosevelt recommended to congress today that a system of highways "to meet the requirements of the national defense and the needs of a growing peace time traffic of longer range."

And, as a means of partially paying the cost of this highway system, he emphasized a bureau of public roads recommendation that in future "taxes" be taken along rights-of-way. This excess land would be rented or sold after completion of the highways, to reimburse the government for part of the cost of the roads.

The president transmitted a letter from Secretary of Agriculture Wallace, concurred in by Secretary of War Woodring, to which was attached a report of the bureau of public roads on "the feasibility of a system of trans-continental toll roads and a master plan for free highway development."

Toll Plan Disapproved
The bureau said it believed a proposed toll system of six trans-continental superhighways would be neither financially feasible nor adequate to meet traffic needs. It suggested instead a system of inter-regional highways designed to meet requirements of national defense and the needs of a growing motor traffic.

"It emphasizes the need of a special system of direct inter-regional highways, with all necessary connections through and around cities," Mr. Roosevelt said of the bureau report.

The president added the report showed there was need for some superhighways but added the need exists only where there is congestion on the existing roads, mainly in metropolitan areas.

Costs Estimated
In a 21-page report prepared by congressional request the bureau estimated six superhighways, three running east and west and three north and south, would approximate a total length of 14,326 miles and cost at least \$2,899,800, or an average of \$202,270 a mile.

The bureau said tolls for a 16-year period—the longest time for which it would make traffic estimates—would provide less than 49 per cent of a conservative estimate of debt service, maintenance and operating costs.

A toll charge of a cent a mile for passenger vehicles and 3.5 cents for trucks, the report explained, would bring in an average of \$72,140,000 annually during this period compared with an average annual outlay of \$184,054,000.

The tentative selection of inter-regional routes made by the bureau included:

New York City to San Francisco by way of Pittsburgh, Indianapolis, St. Louis, Kansas City, Denver and Salt Lake City.

Chicago to Seattle by way of Minneapolis, Fargo, N. D., Billings, Mont., and Spokane, Wash.

Seattle to San Diego by way of Portland and Sacramento.

Boston, Mont. to Los Angeles by way of Salt Lake City.

MINE EXECUTIVE COMMITS SUICIDE

GRASS VALLEY, Calif., April 27.—(AP)—George Worthington, 60, widely known mine superintendent, shot and killed himself here today, Coroner A. M. Holmes reported. Holmes, who ordered an inquest, said all indication pointed to suicide. Worthington's widow survives.

Worthington, who had directed mining work in California, Canada and Mexico, was brought here two years ago by the Potter, Campbell company of New York, to manage the Nevada mine. It closed several months ago and Worthington entered the garage business.

OREGON TO FINISH UNIT OF HIGHWAY

WASHINGTON, April 27.—(AP)—The bureau of public roads disclosed today Oregon had agreed to complete its portion of the Idaho-Oregon-Nevada highway, south-western Idaho's shortcut to California, during the next fiscal year.

Director T. H. MacDonald wrote Senator Clark (D., Idaho) the state would spend all of its 1939 allotment of public lands roads funds on an 18-mile strip of highway, last remaining link in a route joining cross-country routes No. 30 and 40 at Marsing, Idaho, and Winnemucca, Nev.

The highway, when completed will provide a shorter route from southwestern Idaho points to California by eliminating the necessity of going northwest to Portland, Oregon, and then south, or southeast to Salt Lake City and then west.

MacDonald told Clark he had been advised Oregon would award a contract for the construction work in the early fall. The road to be built lies just west of Rome, Ore.

Recap for Tasty Meals Offered Housewives By Homemaking Expert

The Roseburg News-Review cooking school closed today as Mrs. Barbara Miller completed the three-day demonstration in which she left many cooking hints with housewives of Roseburg and vicinity. Among the recipes presented at today's class session were the following:

Six Layer Dinner

1 cup rice (cooked or raw)

1 lb. ground meats

2 medium sized potatoes

1 sliced onion

1 No. 2 can tomatoes

1 cup chopped celery

1 cup chopped green pepper

Butter, Tabasco sauce

1 cup Blue Bell chip crumbs

Method: Arrange in casserole, first the rice, then ground meat, then potatoes, sliced onion, tomatoes, chopped celery and pepper. Season each layer with salt and pepper and butter. Last top with Blue Bell chip crumbs and sprinkle with paprika and Tabasco sauce. Bake 1 1/2 hours at 350 degrees.

Party Refrigerator Cake

1 1/2 cups White Satin sugar

4 eggs

2 cups Umpqua Chief flour

2 tsp. baking powder

1 cup Roseburg Dairy hot milk

1 tsp. vanilla

Method: Break eggs into bowl and beat until light and lemon colored. Add sugar gradually. Beat all the time. Add hot milk gradually and continue beating. Add vanilla and fold in dry ingredients. Bake in angel cake pan at 325 degrees for 1 hour.

Cake Filling

1 package lemon gelatin

1 1/2 cups sliced apricots

Method: Dissolve gelatin in hot apricots. Add pineapple and cool until syrupy. Cut out center of cake leaving shell of about 1/2 an inch. Add small pieces of cake to the fruit mixture and pour all into cake shell. Decorate with whipped cream.

Buffet Party Salad

1 package salad macaroni

1 small can tuna fish

1 cup sliced stuffed olives

2 cups diced celery

1 cup chopped parsley

1 medium sized onion chopped

1 cup chopped green pepper

3 tomatoes

1 cup French dressing

Tabasco sauce

1 tsp. Blue Bell horse-radish mustard

Method: Cook the macaroni in boiling salted water until tender. Drain and blanch with cold water. Add 2 tbsp. French dressing mixed with horse-radish mustard and dash Tabasco sauce. Place in refrigerator to chill then add remaining ingredients, mix well and serve on crisp lettuce with mayonnaise and radish roses.

Pineapple Sherbert

1 1/2 cups pineapple

2 cup White Satin sugar

1 1/2 cups water

2 tsp. plain gelatin

1 cup cold water

Pinch salt

Method: Soak gelatin in 1 cup cold water. Boil sugar and water 5 min. Add soaked gelatin. Stir until dissolved and add fruit and juice. Pour into refrigerator tray and freeze until solid. Empty into chilled bowl, chop fine and whip with egg beater. May be served at once in chilled sherbert glasses or returned to tray.

Guittard's Chocolate Fudge

4 cups White Satin sugar

1 1/2 cups Roseburg Dairy milk

1 cup Guittard's chocolate

1 cup chopped walnut meats

2 tsp. vanilla

1 cup butter

Method: Place sugar, milk, salt and chocolate in pan and cook to the soft ball stage 238 degrees. Add butter and vanilla. Remove from range, add walnuts and beat until stiff. Pour into buttered pan and cool. Cut into squares.

Strawberry Jam

5 cups crushed berries

1 cup water

1 package Pen Jel

5 cups White Satin sugar

Method: Simmer fruit and water few minutes until berries are soft. Add 1 package Pen Jel and stir vigorously. Bring to boiling point and add 5 cups White Satin sugar. Cook to 222 degrees or until jam sets on cold plate. Pour into sterilized Kerr-Mason glass and cover with paraffin.

Company Fried Chicken

1 large fricassee chicken

1 medium sized onion

1 clove garlic

2 cups water

Method: Have chicken cut in small pieces for serving. Place in kettle with onion, garlic, and water. Steam until tender. Drain, dip in batter and fry in Crisco.

Chicken Batter

1 1/2 cups Umpqua Chief flour

1 tsp. baking powder

1 tsp. salt

1 egg

1 cup Roseburg Dairy milk

1 cup Blue Bell mustard

Method: Sift dry ingredients. Beat egg and add milk and seasonings. Beat the two mixtures together. Dip chicken in batter and fry in Crisco that has been heated to 350 degrees. Drain on soft crumpled paper.

Broiled Dinner

1 large steak for broiling

4 medium sized cooked potatoes

6 cooked carrots

3 fresh tomatoes

Melted Crisco

Tabasco sauce

Paprika

Chopped parsley

Salt and pepper

Method: Pre-heat broiler 10 min. Place steak in center of broiler pan and broil about 10 or 15 min. depending on thickness of steak. Dip potatoes, carrots, and tomatoes that have been cut in half in melted Crisco, season well and sprinkle with paprika and place around the steak after it has been turned. Continue to broil until steak and vegetables are nicely browned.

FRANCE SQUELCHING NAZI PROPAGANDA

STRASBOURG, France, April 26.—(AP)—The French government today pushed its efforts to stamp out foreign propaganda in Alsace-Lorraine with confiscation of the current issue of the autonomy-advocating newspaper, "Els."

Police seized copies of the publication when it appeared this morning with an attack against France for recent decrees dissolving three Alsace-Lorraine organizations for pro-Nazi activities.

The full name of the newspaper is "Elsass-Lothringen Zeitung (Alsace-Lorraine News)." It is the personal organ of Dr. Karl Roos, autonomy leader and member of the Strasbourg city council, who was arrested February 7 on an espionage charge. It was charged "compromising documents" were found in a raid on his home.

FREE CITY OF DANZIG, April 27.—(AP)—The Danzig emergency court today sentenced Felix Lawikowski, a Polish citizen, to two months' imprisonment for slandering Chancellor Hitler. Afterwards she is to be expelled as an undesirable alien.

Shouting "hell Moscow" cost a 29-year-old Polish servant girl named Langowska three weeks in jail. Her fiancé, Will Gurski, was sentenced to four months in jail for anti-Nazi activities.

UTILITY WILL PAY FEE ON EARNINGS

ALBANY, Ore., April 27.—(AP)—The Mountain States Power company will voluntarily pay a 2 per cent gross earnings fee to the city governments of 19 western Oregon towns, R. C. Sipe, assistant manager, announced today.

Sipe explained the action would equalize the service among all 30 towns in the Willamette valley system. Two per cent gross earnings levies are already in force in 11 cities.

The new fee order will be effective early in June and will cover May meter readings. Sipe estimated the tax would increase municipal revenues a few hundred dollars in some cases to as much as \$3000 in others.

BUTTER EXPORTS' SUBSIDY SOUGHT

WASHINGTON, April 26.—(AP)—Secretary Wallace said today the agriculture department had been asked by the dairy industry to subsidize exports of surplus butter to bolster domestic prices.

"The secretary told his press conference he was opposed to the request which was made by officials of the National Cooperative Milk Producers' federation."

"If we are to pay a subsidy to move surplus butter into consumption, I believe our own consumers should receive the benefit," he said.

HARLAN, Ky., April 26.—(AP)—Leo Hubbard, 30-year-old former Harlan county deputy sheriff now in the taxi business, was freed at an examining trial today of killing two men in his front yard last Saturday night.

Spice Cake

2 cups Umpqua Chief flour

2 tsp. baking powder

1 tsp. cinnamon

1 tsp. cloves

1 tsp. nutmeg

1 tsp. salt

2 1/2 cup strong coffee
