

2 GAMES WON IN ELEVENTH INNING

White Sox Get Revenge on Tigers; Pirates Drop Seventh Straight.

Before it is completed this major league baseball campaign may be remarkable for many things, but right now it is distinguished for the number and length of its extraordinary games.

In 11 days, during which many contests were rained out, there have been nine marathon matches. The list was padded yesterday by the 13-inning duel the Chicago White Sox claimed from the Detroit Tigers and the 11-inning thriller the St. Louis Cardinals took from Pittsburgh's hapless Pirates.

It was the third meeting of the two American league clubs this season and the second time they worked overtime. One of the two games the Sox played at Detroit went 11 innings with the Tigers finally winning on Greenberg's first home run of the year.

The White Sox got revenge yesterday with Steinbrenner pinch-hitting Mike Kreevich home in the 13th for a 2-1 victory. Kreevich singled four times and scored Chicago's other run.

Pirates Drop 7th in Row
Pittsburgh's seventh consecutive loss in the other extra-chapter story was a bitter dose because the Pirates lost most of the way and seemed victory-bound when Surr hit a home run in the 11th. But Padgett singled in a tying run and the usually steady Pea Young fumbled a grounder which let Padgett also score and win 6-5 for the Cardinals.

The Chicago Cubs and the Cincinnati Reds were headed for a long bout until the Reds burst out with eight runs in their half of the eighth to win 11-3. Goodman, who had homered with one on in the first, led the eighth inning uprising with a single followed by a triple with the bases full.

The Boston Bees and Philadelphia Phillies also decided their fates in the eighth as Al Simmons hit for the circuit and Boston's margin in a 5-4 triumph.

On the other hand the Washington Senators had no trouble subduing the Philadelphia Athletics, 6-3, on the nine-hit knuckleball pitching of Dutch Leonard, who has accounted for two of the Nationals' three victories to date.

The St. Louis Browns eased past the Cleveland Indians, 4-2, with Maroon having a shutout until the ninth when Heath hit a home run with one on for the Tribe.

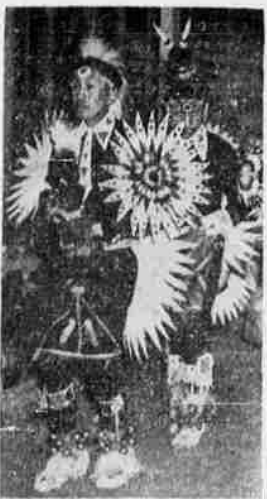

Motorlog Party Visits Indian Festival

Various newspapers in Oregon are co-operating with the Oregon State Motor Association and the Oregonian in sponsoring a series of motor cruises designed to stimulate travel throughout the Pacific northwest.

Following is a report on the first 1939 motor journey. It is condensed from a full-page article appearing in the Sunday Oregonian April 30.

CELLO INDIANS, whose methods of catching leaping salmon date back for generations and today host thousands of tourists on the Columbia River highway, are complaining quietly of white man's progress that annually reduces their supply of fish for food and sale.

For centuries many northwest tribesmen have gathered at Celilo falls, 12 miles east of the present site of The Dalles, conducted their ceremonies and smoked their salmon for winter stores. As the northwest grew, a treaty signed in 1855 gave them the right to continue fishing there, unharmed by laws of encroaching civilization.

Recently, however, commerce and industry have hampered the Indians' activities, they declare. Large catches at the mouth of the Columbia, Bonneville dam and even intrusion of white fishermen at Celilo are blamed for smaller spring and fall runs.

"Fish used to be so thick you could walk across the river on their backs," remark some of the tribesmen whose grandparents saw Lewis and Clark when they arrived downstream and camped at Celilo for three days. "No more. We have to work for our fish now."

Most common method employed by the red men is the dip net. They sit on small wooden platforms, dip their long-handled nets in the white foaming water and wait for the Chinooks to strike. In good seasons four or five hundred families from throughout the northwest may be seen encamped on the banks of the river. Nearby is the Indian village of Celilo, a group of warped wooden shacks and shacks for drying fish. White citizens of The Dalles have conducted numerous unsuccessful "clean-up campaigns."

According to the United States bureau of fisheries, as much as 18,000,000 pounds of fish may be taken from the river in one season. The Celilo Indians subsist largely on proceeds from sale to canneries.

Celilo falls is one of Oregon's most interesting historic spots. The Indian fishing scene has changed little since the days of Columbus. The spring run of salmon begins about April 15 and lasts for two months. The fall run, larger of the two, begins in August and lasts into October.
