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NATIONAL MUSIC WEEK TO BE OBSERVED IN ROSEBURG, MAY 7-13

For the fifteenth year National Music week will be observed throughout the United States. This year music week will begin on Sunday, May 7th, and continue through that week, closing Saturday before National Mothers' day.

Over the entire nation special observance of this particular week will be given, when vast numbers of musical organizations will contribute their part in celebration of this annual event. With the great and important place that music holds in both public and private life it is most fitting that a period of time be set aside each year for special observance of this enjoyable factor in American life.

The city of Roseburg, and surrounding country is, and has been for many years, the home of music lovers and of good music. Not only does each church have its choir and organization of singers, but many other musical organizations have been kept up for years, and each contributing its share towards the advancement of good music in Roseburg and vicinity.

For years the Roseburg Concert band has had wide recognition throughout the state. The school bands have won distinction from north to south, in the state. This county has a most active Music Teachers association, a Men's Glee club, Roseburg Concert orchestra, and many other such organizations, all contributing in the musical line to help make this county a musical center.

This year during Music week special programs will be presented for the public and announcements of which will be made later. The Roseburg Men's Glee club on the second program of the week will be the Angelus Hour, Sunday, May 7.

The second program of Music week will be presented by the Roseburg Concert orchestra, consisting of twenty or more musicians, in their second annual Music Week concert. The orchestra will be assisted in this program by Mrs. Elizabeth Carlson Strang, soprano, of Medford, Oregon, formerly of Roseburg. The people of this city and vicinity will be delighted to have the opportunity of again hearing Mrs. Strang in her musical renditions, at this concert. She will be accompanied by Mrs. Frances Lintott. The orchestra will also be assisted by Harvey Mahoney, of Oakland, Oregon, in special baritone horn selections. Mr. Mahoney for years has been one of the excellent musicians of the Douglas County band. Mrs. Paul Geddes, organist, will assist with organ accompaniment for the orchestra.

This concert will be free to the public at eight o'clock Monday evening, May 8th, at the Methodist church in this city.

The Douglas County Music Teachers association is arranging other musical programs to be given during Music week, the announcement of which will be made later.

The organizations sponsoring the special music features for the week are asking the support of Roseburg and vicinity music lovers to cooperate by attending as many of the programs as possible during the week.

B. P. W. C. STATE CONVENTION TO BE HELD IN CORVALLIS

The state convention of the Oregon Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs will be held at Corvallis on May 5, 6 and 7, 1939, with Mrs. Leona Bryant, of Coquille, state president, the presiding officer, and Mrs. Alice Crabtree of McMinnville as convention chairman.

"Our America" is the convention theme and Irving Berlin's song, "God Bless America," written for and featured by Kate Smith, will be used in group singing.

Mrs. Ross E. Cunningham, national federation's first vice-president will speak on the topic of "My Business and Yours," the program theme for the current year, at the banquet to be held in the Memorial building on the campus of the Oregon State college. An Oregon luncheon, "Pep" dinner, glee club contest and music festival have been arranged, also round table discussions under able leaders.

Unusual emphasis is attached to the state convention this year because of the federation's forward-looking program and the plans that are being made for the biennial convention that is to be held at Kansas City July 9 to 14, 1939.

The national membership has reached an all time record of 64,879 as of March 1, and is expected to pass the 70,000 mark before the year ends. The federation is organized in 48 states, the District of Columbia, Hawaii and Alaska. In addition to carrying on its program theme, "My Business and Yours," which is being used by most states to show the interrelationship of business and individuals in every community, the federation has a broad program of vocational information, and a legislative program which was adopted at the Atlantic City convention in July 1937. The federation is also international, 25 countries being represented. Oregon's Federation consists of 26 clubs.
