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GENERAL tension seems to have been eased considerably now that Herr Hitler has spoken. The reaction on the street yesterday after his contents of his speech were generally known was: "Well, what did he say?"

Beyond lauding a mild sort of a threat to Poland, evidently for the purpose of encouraging the settlement of the Danzig question to Germany's satisfaction, the speech held no threat to European peace. Hitler must have enjoyed delivering his jibes at President Roosevelt and the United States. In doing that he was on perfectly safe ground. By taunting us he endeavored no lives and no property and doubtless thereby became more of a hero than ever in the eyes of his followers.

Maybe it is wishful thinking and possibly it is true that the European situation seems to be settling down—that the possibility of war over there is more remote at this moment than it has been in more than a year.

The great war has already been fought—fought with words and decided by public opinion, rather than by bullets and bombs. It is the first major victory in history achieved in that way.

Hitler obviously feared to begin a fight because of what might happen at home. But he was able to make some mighty bluffs and make them in a way that, though it was a great gamble, he might be supported at home—if they were called.

But he also knew that his bluffs likely would not be called and that, to use a poker expression, he would be allowed to take the pot without a showdown. What he knew, or rather, felt reasonably certain of, was that the people of France and Britain were not ready to go into a war to stop him.

The job Hitler has done can be admired as a brilliant bit of gambling though it cannot be applauded or held out as an ideal national policy.

His methods may be excused, they may even finally be praised, as a means to an end—but only if there is an end, and soon.

If, as seems likely, world power is nearly in balance, an armistice is at hand and the talk we have just heard was the beginning of peace negotiations.

So much now depends upon Hitler's own ambitions and his own psychology. If he is a mad man, crazed with the desire for power and yet more power, there is no answer but destruction.

But if Hitler is a great man, determined only to bring his people, his nation, to a place of great power and respect in the world—without attempting to dominate the little globe—the war is over and peace is being negotiated.
