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In the year 1939 a new federal census of the nation will be taken. It is a job that is done every ten years. But in the meantime unofficial estimates of present population indicate a very satisfactory rate of growth for the city of Roseburg during the ten-year period just past.

The magazine for builders, "Pacific Builder and Engineer," has just completed a survey of 27 cities in Oregon, Washington and Idaho. Roseburg is recorded in this survey as having a greater percentage of increase in population than 29 of those cities. Only six cities on the entire list have grown more than Roseburg.

The average increase for the entire list is 11.8 per cent. Roseburg's population is estimated to have increased 26 per cent.

Increase in population is something that occurs in an unnoticeable way in cities like ours. There has been nothing here to cause a sudden influx—there has just been a steady gain.

Several known factors are considered when these estimates of "guesses" are made. Perhaps the most reliable in the study of the volume of business done by the post office.

In 1929 the postal receipts for the Roseburg postoffice were \$35,553.05. The postal receipts for 1938 totalled \$44,594.61.

It takes no mathematical genius to deduce from those two figures the fact that there has been a substantial population increase in Roseburg during the past nine years.

The reason for the steady growth of Roseburg is probably not due to anything local to the community other than our excellent climate and pleasing locale. The fact of the matter is that the Pacific Northwest is growing at a rate more than half again as fast as the remainder of the United States. This means that there is a drift of population to the west coast and to the Northwest, and that in this drift and resettlement, the Umpqua valley is gaining more rapidly than most of the other sections.

YANKEES, WITHOUT DI MAGGIO, LOSE 2

League Leaders Drop to Tie With Boston; Detroit Mauls Indians.

Joe Di Maggio tore some muscles in his right leg in a fall Saturday and the world champions immediately lost two games to the Washington Senators, yesterday's by a 2-0 score. In both games left-handed pitching triumphed, yet with the right-handed Di Maggio in the lineup New York did not lose to a southpaw any time during the exhibition campaign when as many as nine in a row started against them, nor in league games where they faced three southpaws.

The defeat of the Yankees enabled the Boston Red Sox to climb into a tie for first place by beating Philadelphia Athletics 2-1. Ragby didn't take any chances on his own hit but he did decide the game and contributed a home run to his cause.

The Detroit Tigers both individually and collectively the majors' leading sluggers turned loose a broadside against Cleveland to win, 14-1, with Bridges holding the Indians to six hits and fanning eight. Gehring, who incidentally beat out Di Maggio for the most valuable player award in 1937, proved he still is a valuable hand by getting his third homer of the spring with the bases filled.

Chicago's White Sox sneezed past the St. Louis Browns 4-3, in the other American league game.

Bea Climbs Up
While the Cincinnati Reds were rained out at Pittsburgh the Boston Bees won their third straight to push within a half game of the top. Their 3-2 victory over the New York Giants, who have lost four in a row.

The Chicago Cubs displaced St. Louis in third position by beating the Cardinals 4-1 although outbatted 10 to 6. It was the second pitching triumph for Rookie Gene Lillard, whom the White Sox once turned down as an infielder.

In the other game of the day Brooklyn beat Philadelphia 3-1 on the hitting of Moore and seventh pitching of Hamilton, who now has won three in a row.

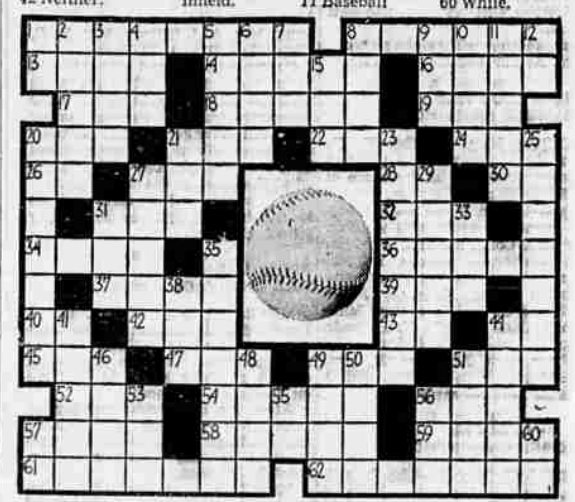
