PACIFIC HIGHWAY ASSN. WILL MEET

EUGENE, Ore., May 1.—Spurred on by President Roosevelt's proposal to cross the nation with strategic highways, the Oregon Pacific Highway association will meet in Salem Friday night to discuss methods of expediting the work.

The president's plan would include a north-south highway along approximately the same route as the Pacific highway in Oregon. The association's main objective is rebuilding of this road.

AAA PROGRAM LISTS CONTROL OF WEEDS

Control of seriously infested plots of perennial noxious weeds, on crop land or noncrop pasture land, is an approved practice by which benefits may be earned under the 1939 agricultural conservation program. The rate of credit allowed for operators for controlling noxious weeds is five units a credit for each acre on which control measures are practiced.

Perennial noxious weeds include Canadian thistle, bind weed or morning glory, white top, leafy spurge, Russian knap weed, and St. Johnswort or Tipton weed, otherwise known as goat weed. The perennial weeds of primary importance to farmers of Douglas county are Canadian thistle, morning glory and St. Johnswort.

It is necessary that the farm operator file with the county committee the exact location of this seriously infested plot or plots of crop land together with a statement regarding the nature of the infestation and secure prior approval for carrying out control measures before actual work starts. Benefits can not be paid for the control of perennial noxious weeds unless the practice has been approved by the county committee.

Chemical treatment may be used to control noxious weeds or mechanical conservation of plots on crop land may be used. When chemicals are used specified amounts of sodium chloride must be applied per square rod. When mechanical conservation is used it is necessary to cultivate at frequent intervals to keep down the growth and prevent the use of fall seed another crop.

The size of area to qualify for rated control is fixed at a minimum of one quarter acre of noxious perennial weeds for any farm. A farm having one quarter acre or more of perennial noxious weeds will qualify for control practices even though it may take several small patches of noxious weeds to total one quarter acre. The farm operator should clearly understand, states County Agent J. Roland Parker, that it is necessary to file a request with the county committee for carrying out practices for the control of perennial noxious weeds. Prior to starting control measures operators should secure approval of the county committee. Immediate requests should be filed by farmers desiring to practice control of noxious weeds as the time to begin practices are limited by the growth and development of the weeds.

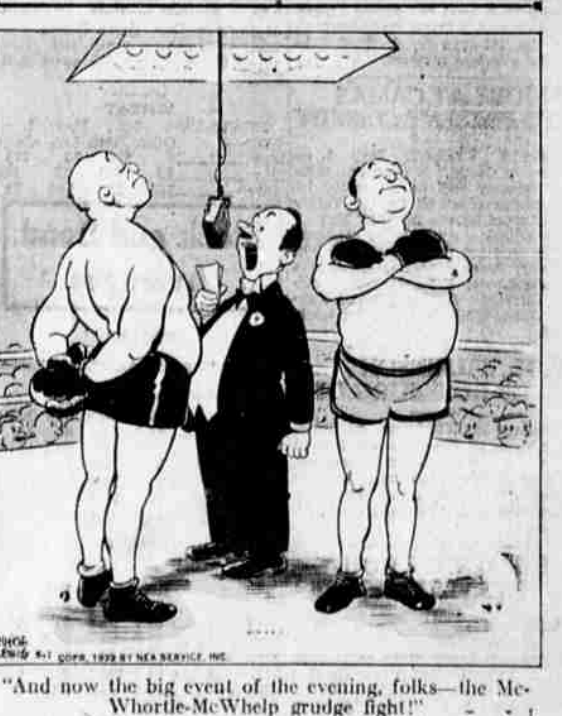
