

SHAKEUP RESULTS IN GIANT VICTORY

Ott-Demaree Shift Halts
Losing Streak; Yankees
Again Top American.

Boss Bill Terry, up to yesterday afternoon, had tried everything but firecrackers in his efforts to jog the Giants out of their slump.
In desperation, Terry turned to the old reliable. He brought Ott to the third base yesterday, and shoved Demaree out into right field.
It worked like a charm. Moore and Harry Danning, whose bats have been so much deadwood, went five-for-three apiece. Danning including a homer in his collection. Combined, the Giant attack was good for 13 hits.
Ott fielded his position perfectly, came up with a timely single during a three-run rally in the sixth and finally clouted a home run into the right field stands in the last of the ninth with the Giants two runs behind, two out and two on base. Thereby the Reds were beaten, 8-7, and the Giants' losing streak ended at five games.
Yanks Regain Lead.
Despite the fact Lou Gehrig was benched at his own request after 2,130 consecutive games, and that Joe DiMaggio was left behind in a New York hospital, the Yankees opened their first western invasion with a 2-2 rout of the Tigers.
That gave exclusive possession of first place back to the Yankees, while the White Sox moved past the idle Red Sox into second place by taking advantage of Lyons' error pitching and five enemy errors to top the Athletics, 4-1. The Senators won their fourth straight, taking a wild-eyed 9-7 decision from the Browns.

Both the first place Blues and the Dodgers were stopped after having won four in a row. Boston's Mac Payden lost, 2-1, to the Cardinals, despite five-hit pitching, and Brooklyn tripped, 3-2, over a three-hitter turned in by Klinger of the Pirates. The Phils came out of a four-game losing streak as 35-year-old Syl Johnson pitched 4-hit ball to beat the Cubs, 6-1.

HOLLIES BEATEN AT PARK DEDICATION

The Pacific Coast league had a full-fledged "premier" yesterday to dedicate Hollywood's own new baseball park, but the Seattle Rainiers staged the fireworks. The visitors banged out 14 hits to win, 8 to 5, and sent the Stars down one notch in league standings.

By the victory the Rainiers hoisted themselves a little closer to the league-leading Los Angeles Angels, who dropped their fourth straight game, 4 to 0, to the Padres of San Diego.

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KIDNAP-TORTURE ORDEAL RELATED

CHALLIS, Idaho, May 2.—(AP)—A fantastic story of hidden gold, torture, stubborn resistance and escape marked the district court trial of two miners charged with second degree kidnapping today.

Frank Casto, prospector in the Estes mountains of central Idaho, who has charged Amos (Dick) Franklin and John Franklin with seizing him and torturing him, told how he finally escaped his captors. Casto said the men attacked him last Nov. 6 in an effort to force him to "come clean" about some high grade gold ore they believed he had discovered.

After beating him and removing him to a secluded cabin, Casto said, the Franklin brothers strung him up with a rope, tying his left leg to his hands and leaving only the toe of his right foot touching the floor.

Casto said he fainted and was cut down. Fearing further torture, he told his captors he had hidden the ore near a distant cabin. He escaped while he was leading them there, he testified.

WAR NOT PROBABLE, DR. EVERSON'S VIEW

McMINNVILLE, May 3.—(AP)—Depleted manpower, strained credit and the diplomatic poker game being played in Europe are three bar-riades to a major war, Dr. William G. Everson, Linfield college president and wartime commander of American troops east of the Ardennes, said yesterday.

Dr. Everson, retired major general of the U. S. army, said manpower reserves "burned up" during the World war have not been replaced to the point where any major European power can carry out a conflict of similar proportions.

Strained credit of European powers would not permit any nation to keep pace with rapidly changing "fashions" in armaments necessary to replace equipment which had be-

come outmoded in the last few months, he continued.

Finally the shrewd game of international diplomacy being played by statements of the democracies is gradually stabilizing the world and minimizing the prospects for war.

PORTLAND, May 3.—(AP)—Five hundred unmarried, employ-able men under the age of 65 were dropped from the Multnomah public assistance rolls this week and urged to find seasonal employment in agriculture.

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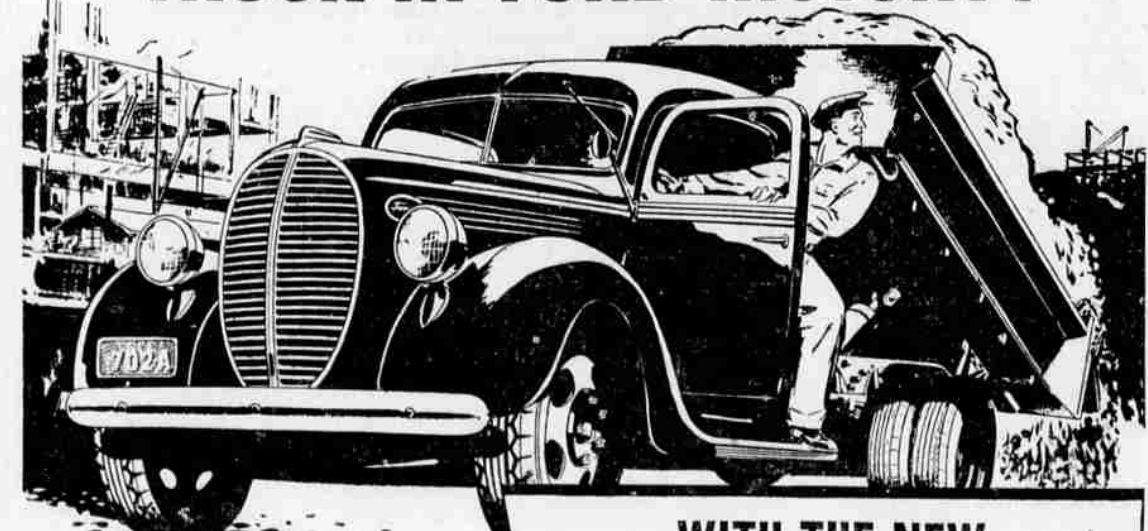
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
