TRANSIENT INGRATE GIVEN COURT SWAT

Herbert Hunt, 42, a transient, received a stiff jolt today when he pleaded guilty in justice court to a charge of petty larceny, and was ordered to pay a fine of \$100 or serve 30 days in the county jail. Judge R. W. Marsters, in pronouncing sentence, declared he had little sympathy for the defendant as a result of the acts to which he pleaded guilty.

It was reported to the court that Hunt came to the Roseburg "hobo" jungles in an ailing condition and that when there had fed him and cared for him until his condition improved. He became intoxicated, served a short term in the city jail for drunkenness and then returned to the jungles, where he again was furnished with food. He obtained a job which paid him a few dollars, which he immediately spent for liquor. Judge Marsters said, then went to the jungles and while the men who had aided him were absent he stole numerous articles of clothing and all available food and started out on the highway, where he later was arrested in a drunken condition.
