OREGON ON UPGRADE, SPRAGUE ASSERTS

PENDLETON, Ore., May 4.—(AP)—Aside from a little worry over drought in some parts of the state, business, industry and agriculture in Oregon are on the upgrade, Governor Charles A. Sprague told a chamber of commerce meeting here today.

The governor intimated that nothing short of a major catastrophe could keep the state from making great economic and social gains in the next few years.

The one bit of advice upon which he did lay emphasis, however, was that capital bestir itself and help to provide the payrolls for the restoration of that general well being that has become a tradition of the state.

Complimenting the last legislature, the governor remarked that he claimed no personal responsibility for its good works, or the good condition of Oregon.

"I inherited a good financial condition and intend to keep it in good order," he said.
