NYSSA, Ore., May 5.—(AP)—Two Nyssa men were drowned in the Snake river near here last night when their boat capsized.

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RIVER STILL HOLDS CORPSE OF YOUTH

The sheriff's office here still is searching for the body of Walter J. Mark, 19-year-old Buffalo, N. Y., youth who was drowned three days after his arrival at the Elkton CCC camp last month. Deputy Sheriff Clifford Thornton, assisted by camp members and Elkton residents, has been difficult for considerable distance down the river from the scene of the accident two or three times each week. Cold water, it is believed, has so far kept the body from floating.

More than 100 sticks of dynamite were exploded in deep holes along the river in futile efforts to raise the body, Thornton said. The dynamite explosions, the officer said, peculiarly failed to kill any game fish, which apparently had been frightened out of the vicinity by the dragging operations, but more than 200 chubs and suckers killed by the blasts were counted.

LONDON, May 5.—(AP)—The death of three fliers near Cottingham airport in the wreck of a royal airforce bomber during maneuvers last night brought to 89 the number of lives lost in 50 RAF crashes so far this year.
