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IN a world that seems to be torn with strife of many kinds, news of the unification of the three Methodist churches comes as a glimmer of light in a world of darkness.

It is a simple but powerful fact that were all people (including dictators) true followers of the teachings of Christ there could be no war. It sometimes seems as though the principles of Christianity are being forgotten in a mad modern existence. People seem to be drifting toward selfishness, toward materialism, toward distrust—toward destruction. That is the gloomy view. It ends in war and war ends in chaos and the destruction of the present civilization.

But there are strong undercurrents of opposition to this headlong plunge toward oblivion. The churches are making progress. The churches of Christianity are the greatest force on earth—greater than the puny statesmen who negotiate toward war and greater than any conflict. Such a ponderous force cannot move swiftly but it can, and does, move surely.

Consider the fact that though to economic depression has crippled this country for years, causing strong banks to close their doors, great businesses to go into bankruptcy and thousands upon thousands of business failures—few churches have closed their doors for want of funds. The churches of America have gained substantially in physical assets during these years when business has been poor and unemployment and relief at staggeringly high figures.

Yet the legal union of the Methodist Episcopal, South and the Methodist Protestant churches is a bright spot in current events. It has taken a long time for the various forces working for this accomplishment to bring about the consolidation. But it is progress and given new hope for the ultimate ascendency of Christian ideals.

This unification concerns only one of the great branches of the Christian faith. It does not mean that Methodism will sweep the world. It means that Methodism is putting its house in order to be of greater service in the great Christian battle against greed, intolerance and war. It is the most important current evidence that the peoples of Christianity are not dead nor dying—but that they are flourishing.

A few facts about the new Methodist church may be interesting. The consolidated church will have nearly eight million members. It will have property investments totaling a billion and a quarter dollars and will raise a budget of over seven millions for its annual work.

Joe Gordon Swats Two to Aid Yankees; Cincinnati Regains League Top

Associated Press Sports Writer—After a two-day stay in second place the New York Yankees climbed back on top yesterday by shelling the Chicago White Sox, 15 to 4, and three four runs which Ruffing gave on nine hits would have won lots of games.

The Cincinnati Reds hammered the Phillies yesterday, 12 to 4, although their ten hits were just one more than Derringer gave. But Cincinnati's homers included a home run by McCormick with the bases loaded and another by Craft with two on.

When the Reds returned to the top of the National League Saturday by beating Boston, 5 to 4, they ousted the Braves a mere 12 to 11.

Yesterday's record had several implications where one hit decided a ball game. The Brooklyn Dodgers moved into second place in the new circuit by beating the St. Louis Cardinals, 21 to 0, on four hits. One of these was a pinch single by Phelps with the bases loaded. It scored both Brooklyn runs. Similarly, Hale delivered a pinch single to score two runs to the tenth inning of Cleveland's game with Washington to give Phelps an 8-7 victory after the youngster did a routine act.

The Philadelphia Athletics had no trouble beating Detroit, 10 to 1, and showing the Tigers into seventh place in the American league after Drucker homered with the bases loaded in the fifth inning.

On the other hand the Boston Red Sox bottled away their first place perch with three errors which gave the St. Louis Browns a 6-3 triumph.

The New York Giants and Pittsburgh Pirates showed home runs aren't necessary if a team gets enough power hits at the proper times.

The Giants got 16 for 25 bases to crush the Chicago Cubs, 10 to 3, while the Pirates blasted 14 against the Boston Bees and won, 8 to 2.

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BEAVER BALL CLUB STAGES NEAR-RIOT

Umpire's Decisions Anger Losers of Two Close Games to Oaks.

(By the Associated Press)—The irritated Beavers from Portland moved across the bay from Oakland to San Francisco today, still grumbling at losing two close ones to the Oaks yesterday, 3 to 1 and 3 to 2, and at a Pacific Coast league umpire named Harry Fanning.

The fact neither Portland nor Oakland could reasonably be called pennant contenders at the moment, and the two losers did not cost Portland the series, does not mitigate the Beavers' ire.

It happened in the second game, when Oakland led 3 to 0. Portland staged a sixth-inning rally that put two runs over with one out. Hawkins was on second with the tying run. Roseburg was up.

TRACK MEET WON BY SALEM TEAM

Roseburg High's Athletes Take 5th Place on Card Held at Albany.

Roseburg high school's track and field team won fifth place with 15 points in the Greater Willamette Valley Athletic Association meet held in Albany Saturday. The meet was won by Salem with 441 points, followed by Eugene 25, Corvallis 24, Albany 16, Sweethome 7, Lebanon 1 and Junction City 2.

The Indian cinder artists were led by Tom Simon, who took first in the broad jump with a leap of 18 feet, 11 inches, and a third in the 100-yard dash. Bob Snoddy, 2 tanks Roseburg high jumper, took second place in his event with a one leap of 5 feet, 8 inches. De Autremont of University high won the event with a leap of 5 feet, 11 inches, to set a new meet record formerly held by Benny DuFresne, former Roseburg athlete now jumping for Oregon State college. Snoddy tied DuFresne's old record with his jump.

Other Indian point athletes were Jim Finlay, sophomore hurdler, who placed fourth and fifth in his two events. Tom Marshall, husky weightman, took third in the shot put. The event was won by Elliott Wilson, a senior, who set a new meet record with a brilliant toss which measured 52 feet, 7 inches. The Roseburg relay team placed third.

Coach Jim Watt's tracksters will open a week of intensive activity in preparation for the district meet scheduled for Eugene, Friday, May 12. Athletes who place first, second or third in this state automatically qualify for the state meet.

Coach Watt believes that Roseburg will have a large number of men qualifying judging from past performances.
