

FARM BILL BOOST SPELLS NEW TAXES

WASHINGTON, May 9.—(AP)—President Roosevelt said today the senate amendment adding \$371,000,000 for farm parity payments and surplus crop removal to the agricultural supply bill had made it all the more necessary new taxes be levied to raise the necessary money.

The president, asked about the situation at a press conference, agreed with Secretary Morgenthau's statement yesterday that the increased farm fund "disturbs me greatly."

Senate leaders, Mr. Roosevelt asserted, failed to carry out their promise of last year to find new revenues to pay for the \$225,000,000 for farm parity payments and now they made the situation worse by tacking on \$271,000,000 more.

He added this would be a factor in any new general tax revision.

The president would not go into detail about the type of taxes, referring the newspaper men to congressional leaders.

Morgenthau said the senate committee bill carrying \$1,216,000,000 exceeded President Roosevelt's budget recommendation by \$272,000,000.

McNARY ASKS THREE BONNEVILLE AIDES

WASHINGTON, May 9.—(AP)—Senator Charles McNary of Oregon asked congress today to authorize Secretary of the Interior Ickes to name an assistant administrator, chief engineer and general counsel for the Bonneville project.

Each would receive a salary of \$8,000 annually.

The proposal was designed to give the secretary greater control over the selection of administrative personnel which, in the past, has been left largely to an administrator named by Ickes.

The legislation would also give the way for the regular appointment of Harry Hinkle, Redlands, Calif., as assistant administrator to Frank A. Banks, the acting successor of the late J. D. Ross.

Hinkle was retained last week on a per diem basis.

Ross did not actually turn a chief engineer, although it was within his power to do so since funds were provided for the post. He chose, instead, to act in that capacity himself, officials said.

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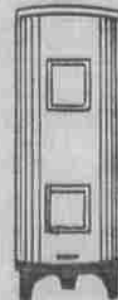
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
