

BUSINESS URGES JOBS RESTORATION

LOS ANGELES, May 10.—(AP)—Suggestions on how to return the country to prosperity came thick and fast before the Pacific Coast Manufacturers' conference, which is winding up a two-day meeting here today.

"Employment must be brought about by production of new wealth, rather than by distribution of existing wealth," declared R. B. Amrose, of Portland.

"The American business man has to keep his eyes on Washington because so much of his business is run there," said Walter H. Wolsenberger, New York, executive vice president of the National Association of Manufacturers.

Frederick J. Koster, San Francisco, contended: "The all-important thing is to liberate the individual so he can take the initiative and make original contribution to human progress. There is good reason for gloom and the reason is governmental, moral, social and economic idiosyncrasy."

U. S. ARMY'S HEAD SAILS FOR BRAZIL

NEW YORK, May 10.—(AP)—Brig. Gen. George C. Marshall, chosen as the next chief of staff of the U. S. army, sails today aboard a cruiser for Brazil on a visit of possible great military and diplomatic significance.

General Marshall, accompanied by seven officers of the general staff, will be the guest of the Brazilian chief of staff, General Monteiro, who will return with the group for a visit to this country.

Particular significance was attached to the visit in view of a recent invitation to General Monteiro by Germany to go to that country for an inspection tour.

The American and Brazilian chiefs of staff were expected to discuss joint plans for defense of the western hemisphere.
