TWO MEN SAVED FROM SNOWSLIDE

STEWART, B. C., May 12.—(CP)—A rescue party early today dug through five feet of wet snow to save the lives of Bert Tronnum and Alie Groat, buried when their tractor and loaded freight sleigh was hit by a snowslide. (Times boys, I'm glad to see you.) said Groat as the rescuers, led by Douglas Campbell, reached him after he had been buried four hours.

Word of the accident was brought to Big Missouri mining camp, near this town at the head of Portland canal on the northern coast of Frank Carington who left his boat caught in the trapped machine and forced five miles through the snow, one foot thick. Campbell, manager of Big Missouri mine and Salmon Gold property, operations conducted by the railroad, left at once for the scene of the accident—Forty Nine Mile hill.

Roseburg said air pockets around the buried tractor and sleigh enabled Tronnum, tractor driver, and Groat, his helper, to breathe while awaiting rescue. Both men are in a hospital at Big Missouri mine, recovering from shock. They were not injured.

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RAIN LACK SHRINKS NORTHWEST CROPS

Region's Record Dry Spell Takes Toll of Fruits, Grain, Pastures.

PORTLAND, May 11.—(AP)—The summerlike spring began today to take a toll in the northwest in shrinking crops.

Nighttime rain in southern and central Oregon merely accentuated the most serious drought in the region's history and the long-expected reports of crop damage began to roll in.

Harvest prospects in the major producing centers have been severely crippled, the department of agriculture disclosed after a thorough canvass of Oregon and Washington.

The dry spell that started March 15 has adversely affected practically all growing crops. Fall sown grain, pastures and hay gained during the warm days at the start of the drought but were beginning to wither under the prolonged aridity.

In mid-April arrested growth and stunted root development appeared in grain fields. The constant sun sucked moisture from the range country and the situation became acute among miscellaneous crops on nonirrigated lands.

Wheat Suffering.

One May 1 the winter wheat plantings were in reasonably good condition but growth began to slow. Since then the inadequate showers have not been sufficient to halt a decline.

Spring crop planting advanced rapidly but germination was retarded by the dry soil. So far precipitation in Umatilla, Udon and Walla Walla counties of eastern Oregon and the Palouse and Snake river areas of Washington has been about sufficient for fall and spring sown crops, the department said, but what follows next is up to the weather man.

Already spring wheat has suffered considerably in the Columbia river areas of Oregon and Washington and the Big Bend country of Washington. Aggravating the absence of normal spring rains is a scant moisture reserve.

Coast Pastures Affected.

Even lush coastal pastures, usually are doosed with rain throughout March, April and May, were beginning to show effects although they have held up better than inland grazing ground. Throughout the northwest livestock men were moving their animals to higher range far in advance of normal migrations.

The national winter wheat crop has been reduced 21 per cent compared with a year ago—in the northwest the reduction was estimated at 24 per cent. Average limitations, however, accounted for part of the cut.

Fruit Crops Slashed.

A smaller fruit crop was also indicated. The set on apple trees showed a spotted condition for vineyards, delicious and new varieties in the Yakima and Wenatchee districts and in the Hood River valley. Peaches, plums, cherries and apricots were hit by frost east of the Cascade mountains. West of the mountains fruit prospects were fairly satisfactory, following the usually favorable conditions for pollination and setting.

Another curse of the drought has been insect infestation. Eastern Oregon farmers and CCC crews fought crawling blankets of Mormon crickets, and bugs have invaded many strawberry fields, and unusually lush caterpillar incubators are worrying fruit men.

Eastern Oregon has reported 12 cases of tick fever and central Oregon reported its first.

A new outbreak of forest and brush fires occurred yesterday after several days during which the fire situation was good. A blaze sprang up in the Weyerhaeuser holdings in the mountains at Klamath Falls. Sixty CCC men fought a 100-acre fire on Catherine creek near LaGrande. An electric

near Odell butte, near Bend. Another fire broke out on Round Top mountain northwest of Forest Grove.

EVEN LOG DRIVE HELD UP

BY SPRING DRYNESS. BEND, May 11.—(AP)—Crops aren't the only things being retarded by the dry spring. It developed yesterday the Deschutes river's big log drive, largest since bygone days of Bonanza logging, would have to be put off until July.

The water in the river was too low to handle the heaps of logs and loggers said they would have to wait until the Crane prairie reservoir storage water was released before dynamiting the logs free and sending them down the stream to a spot near Bend.

The drive originally was scheduled for late May or early June. A few logs are being worked through the Pringle Falls bottle neck but the river's flow has been retarded so sharply by the log congestion that the escapage is slight.
