INTERESTING NEW BOOKS AT ROSEBURG PUBLIC LIBRARY

Interesting new books received by the Roseburg Public Library this week include the following: All in the Days Work by Ida M. Tarbell. There is no evidence of age in this writing, for at 80 Ida Tarbell expresses herself with vigor and originality that have always characterized her work. Her biography is outstanding as a reward of service and also as a candid portrait of a remarkable character and an honest point.

Jane Welsh Carlyle by Townsend Scudder. The materials from which the biography is drawn are Jane's own letters and her husband's together with letters and comments of their contemporaries. Mr. Scudder has taken full advantage of Mrs. Carlyle's brilliant gifts as a writer. There are no imaginary dialogues or scenes in the book, every thing is derived from original sources. The result is a biography which gives Mrs. Carlyle's story as she lived it and as her acquaintances observed it.

The Attractive Home by Lydia Dassel. You have just moved into a house of apartment. You want to know what shade of paint would please you best for the kitchen woodwork—but suddenly you see there are a hundred more problems. What you want is a sympathetic intelligent friend who has good taste and more experience than you. This book is just the kind of friend you want for the time being. It tells you what to do, how to do it, and why to do it.

The Psychology of Making Life Interesting by Wendell White. What is it that enables you to hold attention in conversation? What is it that makes you interesting? And what is it that gives you most pleasure? It is the varied ways in which you express your self and the variety that you offer to others in what you do. Dr. White offers practical advice on how to acquire interesting personal qualities which help in social, business, or public life. He writes simply and clearly and this should prove an eminently practical book.

Was Are These Americans? by Paul B. Sears. Americans ought to understand themselves and their country. Dr. Sears has therefore written this book to tell in everyday language, what an American is, how the American people came into being, and how we as a people may be improved in the years to come, and he tells what America means as a source of food and clothing, not forgetting what it may mean in the future.

The Ramparts We Watch by George Flanders Elliot. A dramatic examination, by a military man, of the adequacy of our national defenses, and a plea for preparedness in the form of a large navy and a small, mobile army. He minimizes the danger from attacks by air, but emphasizes the weakness of our coast defenses, merchant marine and navy.

Here, Last by Dorothy Parker. In one volume, her collected stories including "Laments for the Living" and "After Shek Passes" plus three pieces never before published in book form. Here is her infectious wit, her careful tenderness, shining through the stories that have made Dorothy Parker a legend in her own time.

Elementary Photography by C. B. Nabbits and others. Every step in developing a mastery of photography is clearly explained by text and illustrations that the interested beginner can use the manual for self instruction. Illustrated with many pictures, both photographic and drawings.

Career by Frank by Faith Baldwin. The story of the modern young society girl, properly trained to be a credit to her family, and what she did in revolt against the uselessness of a society career.
