NEW EVIDENCE ON CANCER OFFERED

Origin Traced by Medical Savant to Speeding of Age in Organs.

By HOWARD W. BLAKESLEE Associated Press Science Editor ST. LOUIS, May 18.—(AP)—New evidence on the cause of cancer, showing it originates in organs whose rate of growing old is too highly speeded up, was exhibited today to the American Medical association.

This speeding of old age in vital organs has nothing to do with the calendar, but necessarily with the age of the person affected. The exhibit was shown by Dr. Charles F. Geschickter, of Johns Hopkins university, who is one of the recognized American cancer investigators. It shows some new work on breast cancer in rats and rabbits.

He took rats which never have this form of cancer and caused the disease 100 per cent, by giving them overdoses of estrin, the hormone which in humans and animals develops the breasts in pregnancy.

It speeds the development of animal's breasts enormously. It causes six different kinds of breast cancer, all similar to the human tumor. Some are so similar the microscopic structure is hard to distinguish from human.

Dr. Geschickter is able to produce any one of the six kinds at will. The control is merely the time at which he gives the growth-speeding hormone. If it comes when nipples are developing, then the cancer appears in that part of the breast. The same is true of tubules and other breast tissues.

His microphotographs reveal the story in exact detail. The hormone speeds the maturation, aging and death of the cells at the point which is developing.

Normally, he explains, these and all other tissue cells, live lives of definite periods. They mature rapidly, then have a comparatively long adult life, and finally age and die. Other cells replace them.

The hormone rushes them through this life cycle. The replacements are hurried. When the hurry is too great, the new cells are not

normal. Neither are they cancer, and if the hormone is stopped at this stage, no cancer appears.

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
