IRRIGATION PLANTS RAPIDLY INCREASE

Spurred on by an exceptionally dry summer last year followed by a record-breaking dry spring this season, farmers of western Oregon are breaking some records of their own in the way of installing farm irrigation systems. Alvin King, extension specialist in soils and irrigation at Oregon State college.

King's office has been literally swamped with requests for assistance in establishing supplemental irrigation systems. Everett Davis, extension specialist in agricultural engineering, has been called on to help with the work and four or five irrigation equipment companies have field men working day and night without being able to keep up with all demands.

King estimates that between 400 and 500 farmers will irrigate this year for the first time and that approximately 10,000 acres will be added to some 25,000 in western Oregon already under irrigation. Some farmers who have not been able to install their own equipment have borrowed from others in order to save crops threatened by the continued drought.
