OREGON'S TRAFFIC
RECORD IMPROVES
SALEM, May 23.—(AP)—Down-
side a five per cent increase in
miles traveled, only 15 persons
were killed on Oregon highways in
April, compared with 25 in April,
1938.

The number of traffic accidents
dropped from 2,470 to 2,384, while
the number of persons injured fell
from 457 to 432. Forty-one per
cent of all the accidents occurred
on Saturdays and Sundays,
while 69 per cent of the drivers in-
volved in accidents had six or
more years of experience.
