

RUSSIAN TROOPS ATTACK JAPANESE

Tanks Used in Fighting on
Siberian Border, Says
Tokyo Newspaper.

TOKYO, May 25.—(AP)—The Tokyo newspaper Asahi today published dispatches from Manchukuo belatedly reporting Soviet Russian tanks took part in clashes last Friday and Saturday on the eastern Manchukuo-Siberian border.

The dispatches asserted 200 Soviet troops supported by tanks attacked Manchukuo border guards in the region near Miaoan and Lake Kiangkai, some 250 miles north of Vladivostok. The Asahi did not report the outcome. Japanese regular troops usually are stationed in the Miaoan area.

Domestically reported yesterday seven airplanes of Russian types had been shot down in western fighting in which most of the Manchukuo forces were believed to be Japanese regulars.

FOREIGN SHIPS SUBJECT TO SEARCH, JAPS ANNOUNCE

SHANGHAI, May 25.—(AP)—A Japanese navy spokesman warned today foreign ships entering waters in the vicinity of the China coast were liable to be halted and searched by Japanese warships.

Such action as the stopping and boarding of two foreign liners in two days, the British Itanara and the French Aramis, was "justified," he asserted, because in the past ships flying foreign flags had been used by Chinese for military operations against the Japanese.

(The British government today announced it had protested strongly to Japanese naval authorities against the halting of the Itanara yesterday just outside Hongkong waters. A boarding party left the liner as two British destroyers summoned by wireless appeared.)

(Today the French liner Aramis was reported halted 17 miles northeast of Hongkong and detained an hour while a boarding party examined the ship's papers despite protests of her officers.)

The American liner President Coolidge now en route from Shanghai to Hongkong will enter the "search zone" tomorrow but the spokesman declined to say whether it was planned to board her.

The spokesman also declined to say how far from the China coast the search zone extended but it was indicated it might be up to 100 miles. It also was indicated the Japanese planned to seize any military goods meant for Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's government found aboard foreign vessels.

Business Doesn't Put All Blame On Administration

WASHINGTON, May 25.—The most striking thing about the business leaders who gathered here for the convention of the United States Chamber of Commerce is the fact that they really aren't much like the common public picture of them. They are pretty much "agins" the new deal, but they aren't professional Roosevelt-baiters. They don't think they know all the answers. They are ready to admit that there is more to this depression than appears on the surface, and they're equally ready to admit that they themselves are confused.

Some of them seemed to feel that a change in the national administration would automatically bring back good times. The general consensus seemed to be that no matter who the next president is he will have to take time and use a good deal of patience to restore business confidence. The average guess is that this will probably take him at least a year, regardless of how the election goes.

One Wants Price Fixing
Take Charles Bucher of New York, who owns a lot of coal mines and has 2500 miners working for him. He says he could run his business with 1700 men, but he simply can't take the responsibility for turning the other 800 out of their jobs. He adds that he is selling coal for 13 cents a ton less than it costs him to produce. It isn't like to say the coal companies maintain prices and give consumers a fair test of what that action might accomplish.

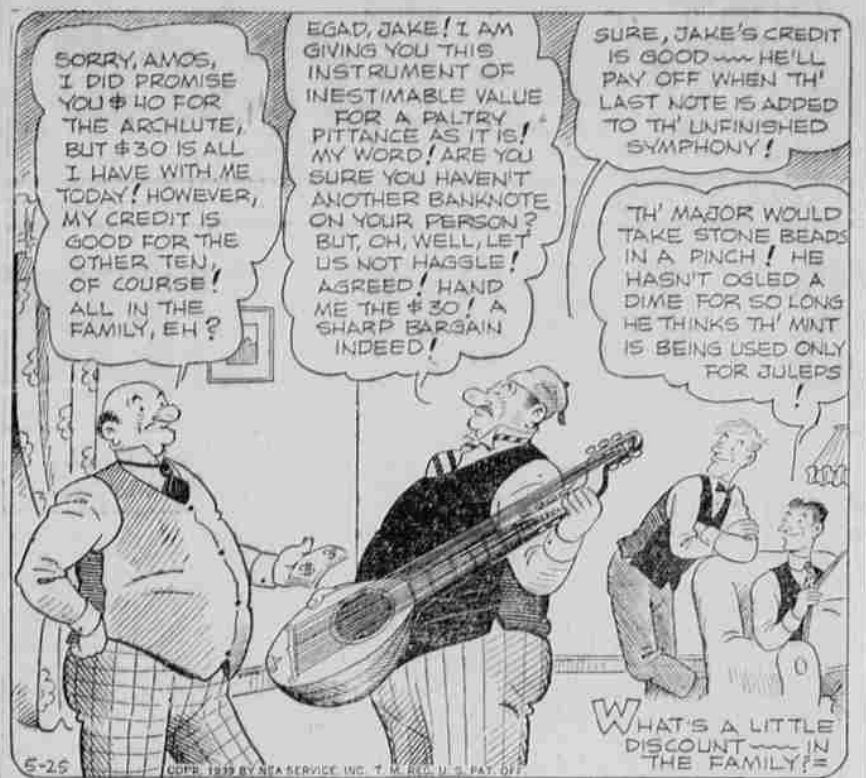

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convened here. Maybe you could class him as an economic royalist, but he is remarkably unlike the popular picture of the breed. He says that now trouble with business is that business men won't get on a unit. They're so busy getting each other's hides that they can't work out a co-ordinated plan of action in their own interests.

He doesn't like work relief, thinks the hole would be better. He's about on a par with the other 25, says the wrongness of work relief struck him most forcibly one cold day last winter when he saw a gang of reliefers shoveling snow on Fifth avenue.

"Some of them," he says, "were not warily dressed. You could see they were improperly fed. One fellow had on low canvas leather shoes. Few of them seemed to have the physical stamina for the job. You can't make a fifth digger out of a tailor."

Another Seeks Confidence
Then there's Harper Sibley, who was president of the U. S. chamber of commerce in 1925-27, who is director of a lot of big corporations like Western Union and New York Telephone & Telegraph.

He thinks the lack of confidence is largely psychological. The president makes too many frightening speeches, and the mere word "taxation" sets Wall Street trembling and quaking.

He'd like to see the president appoint some business men to his jobs in Washington. But for change, he'd also like to see the national labor relations board reformed, says, "It's not a labor relations board—it's a labor organization's promotion board now."

As a farmer, he sees part of the farm problem as due to the tariff. Another part, he says, is due to the disappearance of the horse.

When farms were worked with horses, part of the farmer's land was used to grow crops to feed them. Now that part is used to grow crops for market, which only adds to the surplus.

Looking For A Friend?
Stray remarks at the convention help to illuminate the business man's grievances with the national administration. For instance, "The trouble is there isn't an honest-to-goodness business man in an up-

portant job in Washington."

Or, when a note is read from the convention platform saying that Secretary of Commerce Harry Hopkins is unable to address the convention because of illness, then the murmur goes like this:

"There you are. That's what I say. There's no attempt made down here to be friends with business. Sure Harry Hopkins is sick—but there must be somebody in Washington who knows about business and could pinch his fat for him."

Maybe it isn't quite fair to mention it, but there seemed to be a plaintive note in the sign over the registration desk at the convention. It read "Please register. There is no registration fee."
