BOY SCOUTS CAMP BEING ARRANGED

Registration for 2 Weeks' Outing Open, Program of Activities Listed.

Registration for the local Boy Scout camp to be held July 29 to August 12 is now in progress, according to Ralph L. Russell, newly elected district chairman. Separate committees on finance, operation and program are active in planning the details. Alvin Knudson is chairman of the camp committee.

Included in the activities of the camp will be handicraft, scoutcraft, swimming for beginners and advanced pupils, under supervision of a qualified instructor, demonstrations in archery, first aid, packing, tent pitching, camp cooking and many other scout merit badge subjects. Campfires and entertainment in the evenings will add to the pleasant instructive camp period. Saturday of the first week is sports day with swimming and field meet scheduled with lots of competition and prizes.

Other features of the camp will be an overnight hike and in the second week a hike under a competent guide for three days by slow stages into the Unipqua national forest adjacent to the camp.

Visitors Welcome.

Saturdays and Sundays are to be set aside as visitors days, although parents and friends are free to visit the camp at any time. On visitors days special demonstrations, field meets and courts of honor will be of great interest. One evening in the first week will be set aside as a civic club night and members of the various clubs will be invited to attend the campfire meeting and take part in the program.

The camp staff will include Bob Hill, field executive, scout leaders and volunteers. A competent cook, Mrs. Bertha Taylor, has been employed. She will manage the mess for the 411 club camp early in the month and be in charge of the scout culinary department. The three-day hike will be under the guidance of E. A. Pritton, county 4-H club leader and former scout executive.

The camp is open to all scouts in Douglas county and elsewhere, and all possible attention will be given to those from more distant points. Health and safety will be closely supervised.

Cooperation Given.

The forthcoming camp is the first to be held locally for several years, but it is hoped it can be made an annual event in the future. The scouts will occupy the facilities at the timber Wolf creek CCC camp on Little river, a short distance from the Red Butte winter sports area.

The American Legion, forest service and other organizations, are cooperating in promoting the camp. The general committee consists of Mr. Russell, chairman; Alvin Knudson, V. V. Harpham, E. S. McClure and Leon McClintock. Scouts desiring to attend are urged by the committee to register as soon as possible through their scoutmasters.

An Unpopular, a preliminary event of two days, with one overnight camp at Klamath park, is scheduled for June 16 and 17, in preparation for the summer encampment at Wolf creek.

chairman, said today. "One of the major objectives of our organization is to find jobs for half a million unemployed veterans. The V. F. W. is working in cooperation with the veterans administration, the United States employment service, the National Manufacturers association, and other agencies towards this goal. In the meantime, these 600,000 unemployed veterans and their families must eat. The V. F. W. buddy poppy sale is one of the principal sources of revenue for the relief and supply funds of our organization with which we care for the needs of disabled and unemployed veterans."

ORATORS OF G.O.P. HIT NATIONAL DEBT

WASHINGTON, May 26.—(AP)—Republican orators are stepping out this week with speeches on a single subject—the national debt—thus laying emphasis on a theme which many politicians say will resound through the 1940 election.

The republican national committee, in fact, has proclaimed this as "national debt week." Intended to call the people's attention to the fiscal position of the government, Senator Taft (R-Ohio) said the administration's deficit spending could lead only to "bankruptcy, inflation, and the end of the American way of life as we have known it."

"No government," Taft continued, "ever has maintained a continued deficit without finally repudiating its debts."

Among other republicans who have spoken on the subject are Senator Vandenberg of Michigan, Rep. Martin of Massachusetts, the party's house leader, and Rep. Burton of New York.

The republican national committee has distributed a table showing the trail of the national debt since 1920. It stood at 24 billion in 1920, is about 30 billion at present, and estimates put it between 44 and 45 billions by the end of 1940.

Many leaders of the party say the developing debt and the Roosevelt administration's spending policies helped the republicans to victories last fall.

SINKING ISLAND TALE PROVES MYTH

MANILA, May 26.—(AP)—Three scientists who made a trip to Verde island, about a hundred miles south of Manila, returned today to state they found no indications the island was sinking into the sea, as reported a week ago.

They reported scores of families had evacuated the island after a series of earthquakes starting May 8 and lasting three days. Inhabitants were fear-stricken, they said, after a washwoman with "prophetic tendencies" predicted the island would sink into the sea on May 17.
