COAST GUARD FLIER BARES DOE SLAYING

ASTORIA, Ore., May 28.—(AP)—When Vernon Tully, pilot of a coast guard amphibian plane, saw a man standing beside the bodies of two does, favorites of the army, he really went into action Saturday. Tully, swinging seaward on patrol duty, quickly flashed an alarm to his headquarters. Several of 25 soldiers detailed by Col. Edgar Thompson, Fort Stevens commandant, were directed by Tully's dipping plane to the bodies of the does, lying in the surf where they liked to play under protection of the military reservation. A few hours later, a soldier acting on a description of a car given by Tully, supplied police with a license number and Lloyd E. Phelps, Seaside, was held for questioning. Tully also, from his cockpit, led soldiers to a section of the south jetty where he saw a man hide a gun. Three police found it.

JAPANESE DOWN 57 PLANES ON BORDER

TOKYO, May 28.—(AP)—Domei Japanese news agency, reported today from Hsinking, Manchukuo, Japanese forces had downed 57 "Mongol" airplanes in the vicinity of Lake Buir. The Kwangtung army announced yesterday 17 Outer Mongolian planes of soviet Russian manufacture were shot down in last week's skirmishing in the vicinity of Lake Buir. The lake is in western Manchukuo, near the boundary of the Outer Mongolian state which is under soviet protection.

U. S. TARS EAGER TO WED FRENCH MAIDS

VILLAFRANCHE, France, May 27.—(AP)—Love-stricken sailors aboard the United States cruiser Omaha urged French officials today to give permission to marry about a score of Riviera belles before the ship sails for home June 17. Captain Wallis Lind, commander of the Omaha which has been here over a year, sought to dissuade the men not to take on "additional anchors" at present. "Think it over a lot first," was his advice. It was a race against sailing time. The French mayor, surrounded by the pumping hearts and dark eyes that caused them, had to telephone the ministry of justice in Paris for special permission for the weddings. The sailors had to post ten-day banns. Under French law foreigners may not be married in France unless they have permits to reside in the country for more than a year. The American sailors had no such permits because they live aboard ship. Usually it takes months to get them, so special permission had to be sought prior to the posting of banns. Weddings for which permission had been granted and which were likely to occur before the Omaha departs included Stanley Lawrence Brothers of Freewater, Ore., and Catherine Madeline Epalloute.

GOEBBELS VOLLEYS AT ALLIANCE PLAN

BERLIN, May 27.—(AP)—Pro-military Goebbels sounded a "final warning" today for powers seeking to "encircle" Germany and said "every blow of this front will be answered by us with a deafening counter-blow." The "warning" emphasized anew the seriousness with which Germany views efforts in London and Paris to bring soviet Russia into the British-French front. The foreign office, monthpiece, Deutsche Diplomatische-Politische Korrespondenz said the Rome-Berlin axis would "meet at the right time" the dangers of a French-British-Russian triple alliance. Goebbels' warning followed a statement on the institute for economic inquiry that while Germany has become Europe's leading industrial producer, its economic machinery is straining under the severe load of the four-year-plan for economic self-sufficiency and a tremendous armaments burden.

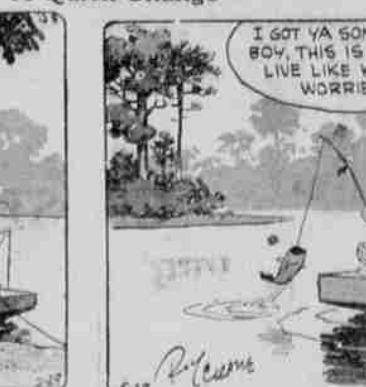
