## WIMBERLY DEFERS REYNOLDS PENALTY

EUGENE, May 29.—(AP)—Sentence of Hugh W. Reynolds, found guilty by a jury in circuit court here of perjury, was postponed by Judge Carl E. Wimberly this afternoon until June 12.

Sentence was to have been pronounced today but Frank B. Reid and Clyde N. Johnston, attorneys for Reynolds, had decided to file a motion for a new trial and asked for time to prepare their brief. It will take at least two weeks to transcribe the testimony. Judge Wimberly ruled Monday afternoon when the case came up that the motion, for a new trial could not be filed until after sentence and advised the attorneys that the arguments on the motion would be heard after sentence is pronounced.

Reynolds was convicted by a jury in circuit court May 19 on a charge of breaking window glass in a labor disturbance here.
