

THREAT TO UNITY OF AMERICA SEEN

Class Hatreds Now Beset
Nation, Senator Byrd
Says at Gettysburg.

GETTYSBURG, Pa., May 30.—(AP)—Senator Byrd (D., Va.), the first southerner to deliver the Memorial day address on this civil war battleground, declared today sectional hatreds between the states had been replaced by new class animosities.

The nation's unity, he said in a prepared address, is threatened by "racial and religious prejudices and envy, hatred and jealousy between those who have accumulated property and those who have not."

"What will it accomplish, Mr. Byrd asked, 'to achieve sectional unity, only to be divided by economic dissension?'"

"What will it profit us to rejoice that the unity of states is strong, if sappers and miners are permitted to work underground to weaken the very foundation of our system of constitutional democracy?"

Continuing the nation needed "not more federal government but better local government," Byrd urged his hearers to "resist the trend of federal centralization."

Liberalism Defined
"A liberal and democratic government does not mean being liberal with other people's government," he said. "Among other things, true liberalism in America means preserving and protecting from attack from any source whatsoever the immortal principle that our government was established in three branches—the judicial, the legislative, the executive—free of coercion or control, one from the other."

"Only a government financially solvent is a government founded upon the liberalism of democracy. The preservation of fiscal solvency capable and strong enough to meet any great national crisis is an obligation inherent upon those who wish the generations to come to enjoy the same freedom we have today."

"The maintenance of law and order under all conditions; the preservation of the principle of the sanctity of private property from mob possession are the basis of every form of liberal democracy; in fact, of any form of constitutional government."

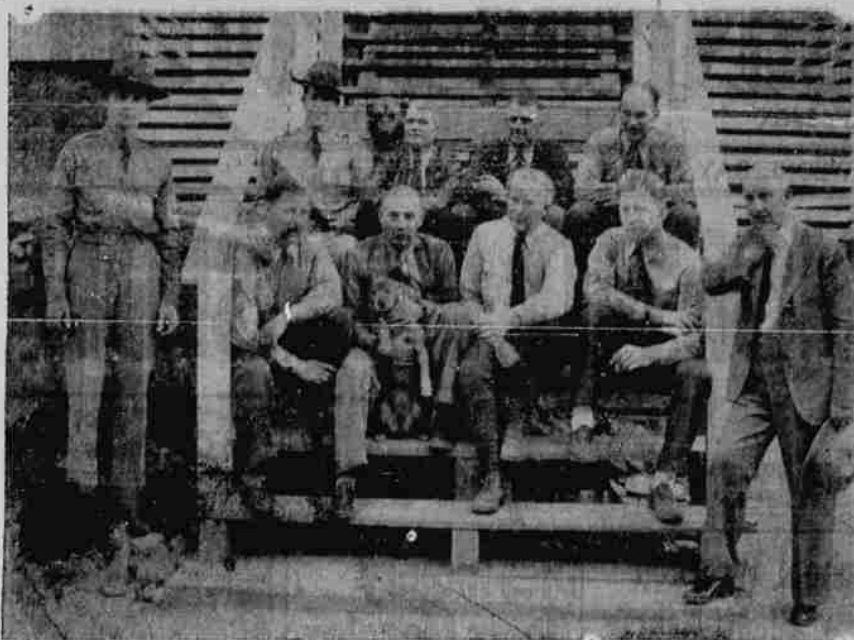
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Officers at Steamboat C. C. C. Camp

RELIEF BILL GOES PAST TEN BILLIONS

WASHINGTON, May 30.—(AP)—Federal emergency relief expenditures by all government agencies between April 5, 1935, and April 26, 1936, totaled \$10,988,757,126, the treasury reported today.

Of this amount, \$2,212,442,300 was spent in the first four months of this year.

Total expenditures and expenditures for the first four months of 1939, by states, included California, \$551,652,245; and \$95,007,218; Oregon \$91,421,870 and \$15,320,838; Washington, \$187,442,264 and \$37,356,775.
