HOME SITE IDEA OF ROOSEVELT GIVEN

HYDE PARK, May 31.—(AP)—At his home here yesterday, President Roosevelt told reporters his own Dutchess county should have an ordinance providing the homes in country districts should be built on tracts of no less than two acres and with a frontage of at least 100 feet.

He intimated he believed similar restrictions might be a good thing in other parts of the nation.

The president explained that on two acres a family could sustain itself at least partially in times of unemployment.

In the west, he said, it has been learned a house, garage, lawn and roadway will take up most of a single acre, whereas two will permit a family to keep a cow, and plant a few fruit trees and maintain a vegetable garden.
