THE Tiller-Trail cutoff is in very fair traveling shape—a bit rough, but nothing to worry about. Much of the distance beyond the summit, now in process of being surfaced with finely crushed rock, is not even rough. Here and there a high "middle" is to be seen, and must be avoided—but for the most part a fair speed may be maintained in perfect comfort, and absolute safety.

For several years my wife and I and some friends have planned a trip to the "Mystery House" on Sardine creek, near Gold Hill. I believe I have told you of the place before, and of the magic you will find there. It really is very little use trying to describe it, except to say that within the confines of this tiny old adobe's office and its immediate vicinity, the laws of gravity seem to be plumb away. To appreciate it you will need to see it for yourself, and I suspect that if you should make a trip there for that purpose you would not ever afterward consider the time wasted. At any rate, our party didn't.

When we left Roseburg yesterday, we really intended to go to Gold Hill via Grants Pass, and return. But somehow or other when we came to Canyonville, on the way down in the morning—we left here at 9:15—the South Umpqua route beckoned, and we headed the horn of our car toward Tiller, and the cutoff.

Near the summit of the pass above Drew, we saw a doe. She bounded across the road in front of us and down the side of an intersecting ravine, pausing, however, as soon as she got within a fringe of brush there, to have a good look at us. We stopped and had a good look at her. She was all diked out in a beautiful, dark, new spring suit.

Arriving at Trail, it seemed a shame at this early an hour to lack comfortable time of being alone—to turn downstream. I was afraid we'd have to find a spot in some valley to eat our picnic lunch. So we wheeled up the Rogue instead, and ate our fried chicken at one of the most entrancing camping spots I know of anywhere in the country—at Woodruff Bridge. Forest Camp, on the banks of the river near the intersection of the Pacific North forest road, with the Rogue River highway below Elton Creek.

Well, of course, by that time we were no near Crater Lake we never even considered not going on to see it—particularly so because two of our number never had laid eyes on its glory before.

When we skirted the rim to its rim and its really awesome beauty was suddenly revealed to us, it was suddenly as if I wanted to know those two would exclaim: "My! It's just as blue as the pictures, isn't it?" But they didn't. Somebody must have told them. (You know, of course, that in the back woods when seeing the lake for the first time, it is the one surprise made by the first man ever to see it.)

The day was fine and beautiful, cool and refreshing, with just enough heavy clouds in the sky to lend the magnificent panorama of lake and enveloping cliffs a proper background.

Quite a bit of snow still is in evidence, although (as to all buildings and observation posts are closed. The Summit Memorial is locked as yet, however, and none of the other buildings seemed to be open, except the fine, new comfort station, which fortunately was.

Possibly a hundred people were at the lake during the time we were there; a fair sprinkling of
